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# York - Ontario Urban-rural student exchange program

**YORK-ONTARIO** - The Urban - Rural Exchange Program is for young people. Young people in the city and young people on the farm. It is for young people who are interested in how the "other half" lives, for those who want to share their experiences with someone else. It is hoped that Urban young people who have had little or no ex-

perience of farm living will take advantage of this opportunity. All elementary and secondary school children, aged 12 - 15 years, can participate. What really happens on the exchange is all Urban Applicants, who are accepted to go on the exchange, will spend one week on a farm. They are expected to live as part of the family on the farm, and to participate in

all their activities. The return exchange is similar. A member of the farm family, who acts as principal host during the first half of the exchange will have the opportunity to return to the home of his or her city visitor. Urban young people may apply to participate in the program through their schools. Rural young people may also apply through their schools

or at their local Ministry of Agriculture and Food Office. Anyone can qualify as a host family as long as their major source of income is from farming, and it is a family operated enterprise. It is not essential that they have children of their own aged 12 - 15 years, but their interest in young people is the main thing.

All details and arrangements will be taken care of by the Urban - Rural Exchange Program Co-ordinator in your area. The co-ordinator for Ontario, Victoria and York Counties is Alex Leask.
