MARKHAM - A Centennial Softball Tournament, the largest ever organized in the area, will be held at Morgan Park, Markham and Crosby Park, Unionville, June 23, 24 and 25.

Twenty-six clubs have filed entries, including six from Toronto; three from Scarborough; two from Markham; Bay Ridges, Unionville, Bradford, Whitby, Willowdale, Weston, Newmarket, St.

Catharines, Vandorf, Markham Mayor North York, Green-wood and Galt. Tony Roman will toss in the first pitch.

STOUFFVILLE - Jim McKenney, Toronto Maple Leaf's foremost offensive defenceman, predicts the newly-formed World Hockey League and the established N. H. L., will merge to become one, in three or four years.

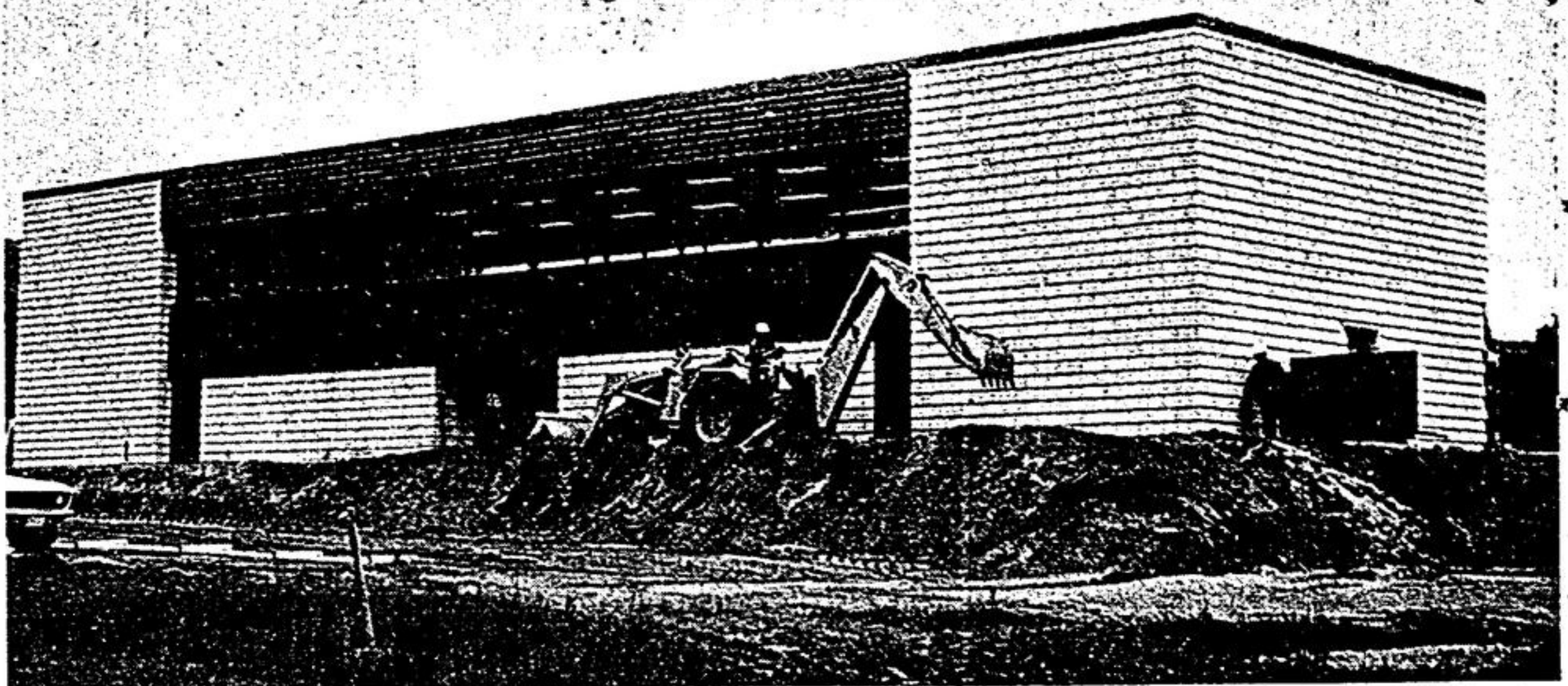
The flashy rearguard was a guest at a Lions-sponsored banquet, Friday, honoring both the Bantam and Midget teams, Ontario Finalists, 1971-72.

Jim McKenney said there was no doubt in his mind, the W. H. L. would operate. He noted that should a merger take place some time in the future, the World Organization would have by-passed the \$5,000,000 admission fee, now required by the N. H. L.

With regard to suggested salary demands of current National Leaguers, McKenney admitted to a form of 'greed'. "We're not worth it," he said. At the same time, he pointed to the fact that the life span of an active hockey pro is short. He said too, that unlike some employees, they cannot change jobs once they sign a contract, unless a trade is arranged.

"It's not necessarily good for the game," he said, "but it's good for us."
