CLAREMONT Robert G. Roy of Claremont has never been one to accept intrusions on his privacy without speaking his mind. Naturally, then, with a multi-million dollar international airport proposed for an area on his 'front doorstep', residents have been waiting for Mr. Roy to come out either 'for' or 'against' the project. They need wait no longer.

This week, The Tribune is in receipt of a 5-page statement under the heading 'Airport', and while it deals with many other issues, assessment, taxation, etc., the final two paragraphs leave no doubt concerning his stand. They are published here without alteration: Where did they get the idea that by depriving you of the 'privilege' of looking at your privy from your front verandah is going to spoil the landscape, when a \$2,000 million investment would make such farmland a renaissance of progress with ultra modern hotels 20 stories high, with temples of commerce

Submits resignation

YORK REGION - The Police Commission considered four resignations from members of the Regional Force at a meeting, June 26. With respect to Detective Bruce Findlay, Chief Crawford explained that Mr. Findlay is leaving police work in order to develop some property which he owns in Newmarket. "He's a very good officer, and I'm sorry to see him go," stated the Chief. The other resignations were from Constable Bill Thomas, Cadet Wayne Bell, and stenographer Mrs. Marion Stoltz. After brief discussion, the Commission accepted all resignations.

Obstructed police

Public inquiry - Deacon

YORK-CENTRE Donald Deacon, M.P.P. (York Centre), has called for a public inquiry into the need for a second Toronto airport and also the planned creation of Cedarwood, a city of 200,000 people on the borders of Metro.

With respect to the airport, Mr. Deacon claims the issue has become clouded and confused by so many varying sets of figures. "Only an independent public inquiry before the Canadian Transport Commission, could stand a chance of getting to the bottom of all the conflicting

evidence", he said. On the subject of Cedarwood, Mr. Deacon feels the whole concept works at cross purposes with the goals of the Toronto-Centred Region plan. The original idea was to guarantee dispersal of growth away from Metro. "The building of a city the size of London, Ont., alongside the north-east boundaries of Toronto, can hardly be called 'dispersal of growth'", he said.

In addition, he charged, the building of such a city near a noisy international airport seems even

more ludicrous. Mr. Deacon has also taken a dislike to the methods used by Queen's Park to make its proposals acceptable to the people. He calls it tantamount to bribing the citizens with their own money.

The Member suggests the inquiry concerning Cedarwood be administered by the Ontario Municipal Board. "It has shown itself to be unbiased and unaffected by the opinions of the Provincial Government or any municipalities, large or small", he concludes.

100 lot development discussed by planners

STOUFFVILLE - A 100-lot development north of Stouffer Street, was considered June 23, by Planning Committee.

Toby Barwick, representing Suncrest Construction, placed the plans before Committee members. The proposal calls for approximately 100 single-family homes on 18 acres.

Mr. Barwick indicated that the major obstacle is the small, four-inch watermain serving the area. His company proposes to replace this with a 12-inch main, at an estimated cost of 80 to 100 thousand dollars. Suncrest, said Mr. Barwick, is prepared to pay "not less than half" the cost of this project, which would serve a large area of the east end.

"We would expect to pay our normal fees and levies, over and above that", stated Mr. Barwick.

Roads Committee Chairman Gordon Ratcliff indicated the watermain proposal had been considered. He expressed some uncertainty about the route the main would take.

"The tenders haven't yet been let for the extension to our sewage treatment plant", warned Planning Chairman Tom Lonergan. Mr. Ratcliff agreed, suggesting a decision should be deferred "for a couple of weeks".

The Committee examined the Suncrest plans thoroughly, discussing frontage, lot areas, and other matters. Mr. Barwick stated that his company intends to do the actual building, and that the houses will average five to seven thousand square feet in area.

"There aren't too many complaints about the plan itself", observed Mr. Lonergan, in summation. "You might do some re-designing". Mr. Barwick agreed to have alterations

Airport planning

Not excluded-Newman

ONT. SOUTH - Area M.P.P., Bill Newman does not feel he has been deliberately excluded from Airport planning meetings at the provincial level. Some misunderstanding arose from a recent newspaper article, indicating Mr. Newman was barred from discussions.

The member sees it in a different light. "Our ministry (Transportation and Communications) is only doing general planning on roads for the site", he told The Tribune. "It's Darcy McKeough's group

that's responsible for all the detailed work so far".

Mr. Newman, as parliamentary secretary to Transportation and Communications Minister Gordon Carton, has been present at the meetings within that Ministry where roads for the project were discussed; but he emphasizes that no detailed work has been done as yet.

"I told the Minister that when he gets into detailed planning, I'll probably just sit there and disagree with everything that's said anyway", said Mr. Newman. "I told him he could feel free to call meetings without my being there, if he wanted".

A consistent opponent of the Airport since it was announced, Mr. Newman has not changed his stand. "I've kept myself up to date on the developments, perhaps more than most Members", he stated.

Charged with assault

GORMLEY - An incident June 20, south of the Gormley Road, on the 3rd Concession, terminated with three men facing charges. Apparently York Regional Constable Bonner was investigating a disturbance, and placed one man under arrest. Two others interfered and the arrested man escaped.

William David Duckworth, 18, R.R.2, Gormley, and Ernest Keefe, 38, of Willowdale, both face charges of obstructing police and assaulting a police officer. John Brash, 33, of Gormley, is charged with assaulting an officer and escaping custody.
