

Bill Paine of Vandorf

Example of a public-spirited man

VANDORF - On his way to the Vandorf Community Hall, July 12, Bill Paine paused for a moment to view activity in the Park across the road.

The lights were on, the grass was green and trimmed, and children by the dozens romped about on the immaculate grounds.

As he watched, he undoubtedly recalled the time, less than seven years ago, when the area was little more than a ten acre weed patch.

That was before Bill Paine and several more, including Town councillor Betty vanNostrand, rolled up their sleeves and went to work.

The result - a rural playground second to none in the municipality.

With this, and many other accomplishments, a symbol of free-gratis service, Bill Paine

attended his final meeting of the Whitchurch - Stouffville Recreation Committee.

He tendered his resignation several weeks ago, both from the parent organization and the Vandorf Community Centre Board. Health reasons prompted the decision.

Betty vanNostrand, in commenting on Mr. Paine's efforts through the years, termed him "a public example of a community-spirited man."

Mrs. vanNostrand recalled how, in 1965, a group of concerned citizens in the area, looked out on the Vandorf Park, and what they saw, was not what they wanted. "It was really a mess - a terrible state - a disgrace to the community," she said.

Following a meeting, the Vandorf Parks Committee was formed. The members planted flowers and trees; constructed picnic tables; cut, clipped and painted, until, out of chaos, some semblance of order was restored.

But the committee's efforts didn't end there. Rather than request total funds from Council, they set out to raise money on their own. They put on

a play and packed the Hall two nights in a row; they held an antique show and organized a donkey baseball game. All events enjoyed excellent success.

The ardent 'push' behind each was Bill Paine.

"When we needed someone with a hammer, a paint brush or a saw," said Mrs. vanNostrand, "he talked about it, he planned it and then he did it."

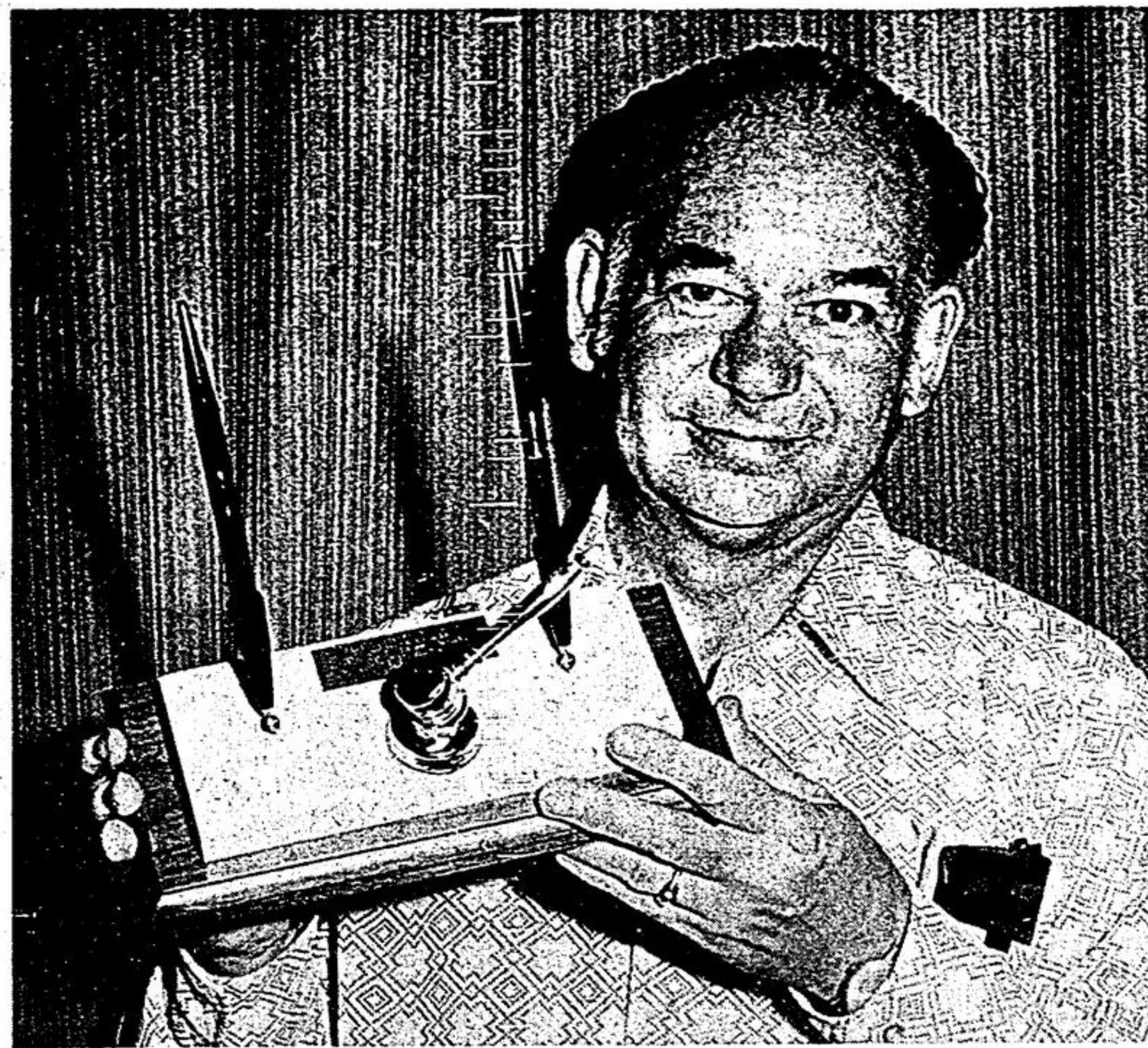
He is a past chairman of both the Vandorf Community Centre Board and the Town Recreation Committee.

Ed Grimshaw, the Committee Chairman for 1972, described him as "a really great fellow". In recognition of his work, a gold-plated gavel on an engraved wood stand, was presented.

Mr. Paine, in reply, said he never regarded himself as a 'kingpin' in either organization, but only 'one of the helpers'.

"As long as Betty (vanNostrand) was part of the group, success was assured," he said.

Let garbage stay suggests minister

STOUFFVILLE - A request from Whitchurch - Stouffville Council, that garbage illegally dumped in a gravel pit, south of the Bloomington Road, be removed on orders from the Minister of Environment, has been mildly rejected by Hon. James Auld.

"It is my view that the matter should not be further pursued," stated the Minister. He went on to explain that the problem occurred during the Toronto garbage men's strike, but his department had acted "promptly and efficiently".

Some members reacted bitterly. Councillor Tom Lonergan said the Town could attempt action on its own, but added, "that's another bylaw we might just as well throw out."

Councillor Betty vanNostrand argued that since the property owner had accepted the refuse, he should be the one to have it removed.

Mayor Ken Laushway observed that charges could be laid, but expressed no desire to drag the Town into a costly lawsuit. The Mayor's stand was supported by councillor Herb Simpson.

"Let sleeping dogs lie," he agreed.

Unionville Bypass Low on priority list

UNIONVILLE - It may be a long, long time before residents see work begin on a much-discussed bypass for Unionville.

At a meeting of Regional Council, July 13, members considered a report from the Engineering Committee. Citing increasing traffic, the report admitted that a new traffic artery in the area was needed. It went on to state, however, that Main Street's inclusion "into the required traffic

artery is not feasible and a bypass around the area to meet Kennedy Road north of the present community is indicated".

Despite this, no recommendation was made as "there is not sufficient information available". Concern over the complexity of a route over a river, a railway, and a main highway was expressed, and further studies will be made. The report was approved by Council.

Mayor Ken Laushway was not satisfied.

"I want to know what is being done about the north part of Kennedy Road", he stated. "I'll be forwarding a couple of bills I've received from people for damage to their cars, from driving on that stretch".

Commissioner of Engineering Denne Bosworth was non-committal.

"We are presently doing spot-patching to eliminate the worst spots", he stated. "Anything more will require complete reconstruction."

Sgt. Robt. Hadden Quits York force

MARKHAM - Patrol Sergeant Robert (Bob) Hadden, 35, R.R.1, Markham, has resigned from the York Regional Police Department. He has accepted a position on the police staff, Town of Uxbridge.

Patrol Sgt. Hadden joined the former Markham Township force, Jan. 18, 1960. He has continued to work out of the Buttonville office since that time.

His resignation, along with four others, was received and accepted, Monday, at a meeting of the Police Commission.

Others leaving are - Inspector Joseph Rainey; Constables Brian Thurston and Leroy Chance, and clerk, Linda O'Brien.

Inspector Rainey's association with police work goes back 17 years. Chief Bruce Crawford informed members that Mr. Rainey had accepted a position on the staff of the Richmond Hill Waterworks Department.

The Commission authorized Chief Crawford to hire replacement personnel.

Company operators, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Van Bell, have notified the municipality of their intentions, through solicitor Robert S. Onyschuk of Toronto.

The case, scheduled for July 13, has been adjourned.

Giles operation still growing

STOUFFVILLE - The business location of Giles Chev-Olds Limited, Main Street and Fairview Avenue, will be expanded to almost double its present size.

Construction to both the north and west, received Planning Committee approval, July 14.

Part of the new area will be used for servicing and part for storage.

The only problem confronting members was a conflict between two bylaws - a new set of rules that is still awaiting Provincial sanction, and old regulations. The new bylaw requires a 20-foot setback on the side. The old one demands only 4 feet.

Mayor Ken Laushway said exceptions had been made in the cases of Card's Hardware and Roberts' Trailer. He felt the Giles application should be similarly treated.

Chairman Tom Lonergan said the area in question was zoned commercial.

The Building Inspector was authorized to issue a permit under the terms of the old bylaw.
