Mrs. Frewin will compete in the semi-final singles match, to be held in Ottawa during August.

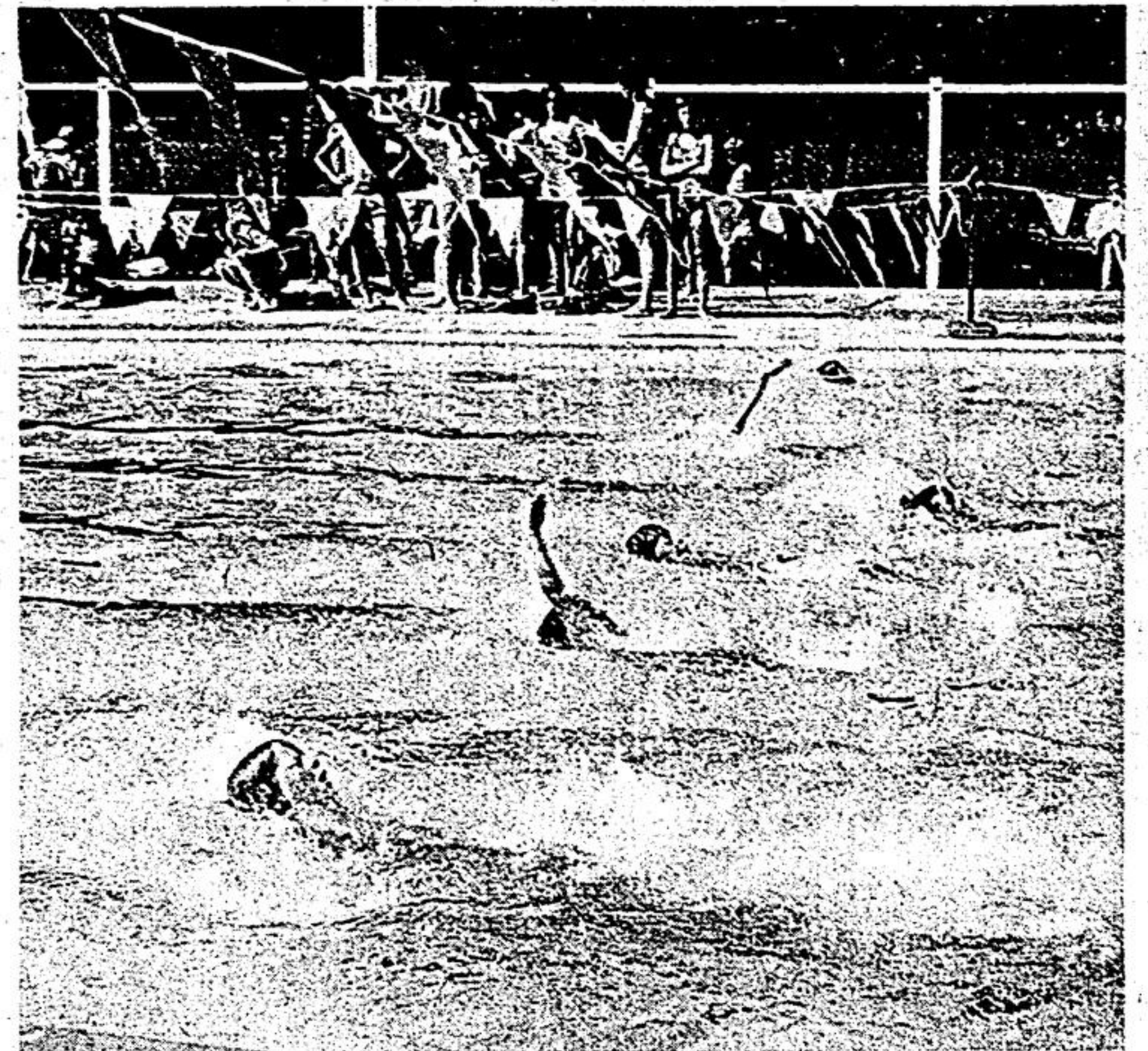
Ladies lose game 25-15

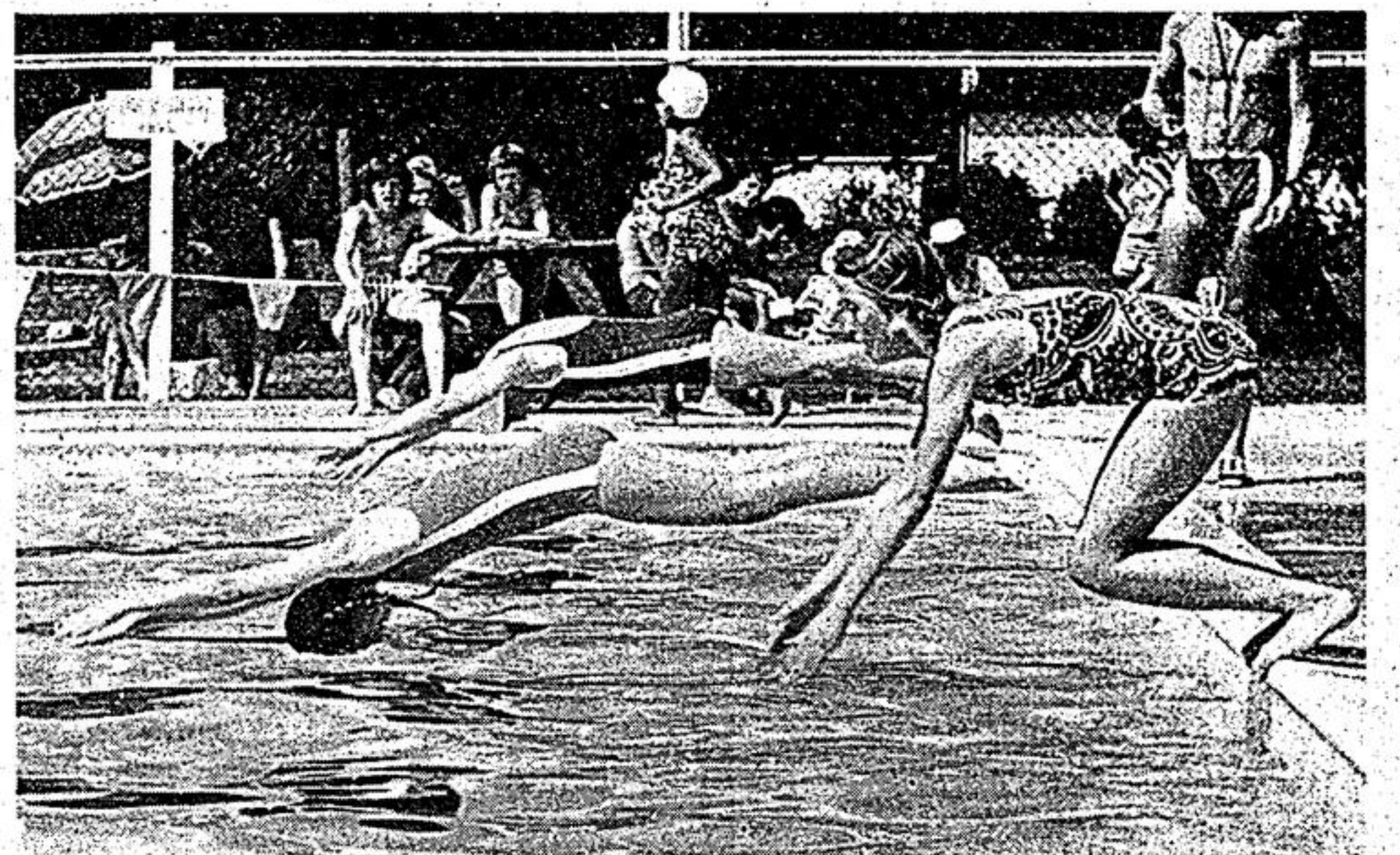
A chance for revenge will come Thursday (tonight) when the local team travels to Ajax for another try. It should be a game worth seeing.

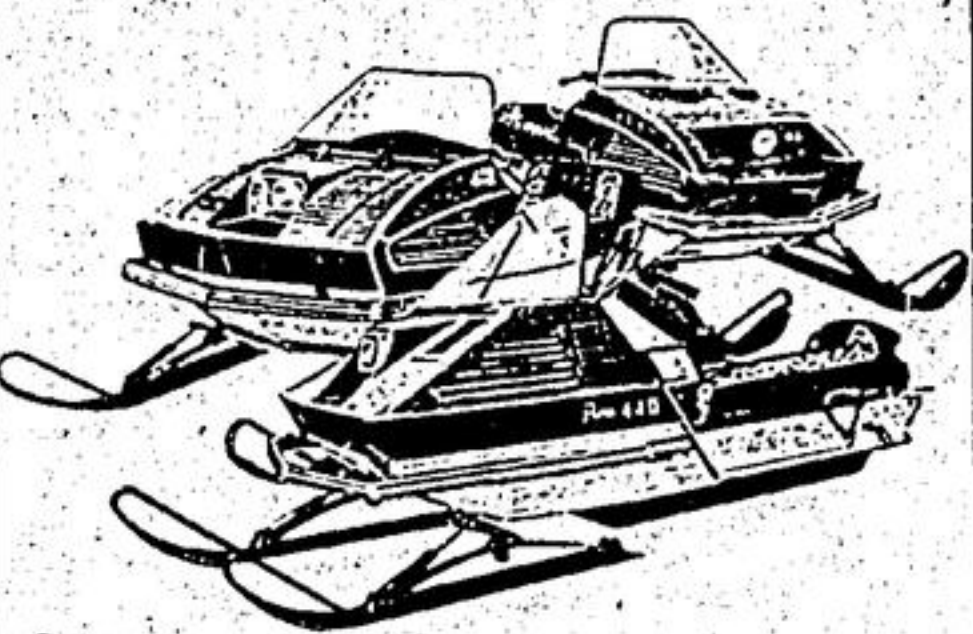
