# Uxbridge television tower sets precedent

UXBRIDGE TWP. - Township Council has reversed its stand on the controversial Cable TV tower, turned down July 24.

The subject was raised by Councillor Clark Muirhead at a meeting July 31.

"I understand some new information has come to light", said Mr. Muirhead. "This is a matter of some concern to the people in Uxbridge".

Reeve Bob Nesbitt revealed that he had spoken with the Ontario County engineer, who was concerned about the project. Apparently an arrangement has been made between the County and Mr. S. Compton, who wishes to build the tower.

While somewhat complicated, the idea seems to be that Mr. Compton will undertake to build a 400-foot tower on the site of an elevated structure presently owned by the County near Concession 7. The Cable facility and the County would share this facility and Mr. Compton would pay a form of lease over a period of 5 or 6 years. At the end of that period, the tower would become County property.

"This is a unique situation", said the Reeve. "I think we should consider this very carefully". Councillor Darcy Higgins pointed out that investigation revealed the Township could expect no revenue from the installation. Mr. Muirhead urged Council to demand that

Cable TV service be supplied to at least some Township residents.

"I don't think we need to worry about that", said Deputy Reeve Don Jackson. "If there are enough houses, they'll want to put in the service anyway".

Mr. Jackson felt, however, the Township should charge some fee for allowing a tower to be erected. "Why can't we pass a bylaw charging \$1,000 to erect a tower?" he asked. "We charge \$500 for a lot fee, but this man is putting up a huge tower and not paying a penny".

Considerable discussion followed and it was revealed that the Township has no bylaw governing this kind of construction. Mr. Higgins supported the issuing of a building permit for a shack to be erected next to the tower. "What harm is it

going to do?" he demanded. "None whatsoever".

"A 400-foot tower isn't pretty", observed Mr. Muirhead.

Mr. Higgins, seconded by Councillor Frank Hendy, put forward a resolution to authorize a permit for the County property in Lot 16, Concession 7. Mr. Muirhead was still doubtful.

"We're speaking of things that are forever - I don't want to see this become a

disaster", he said.

Mr. Jackson continued to maintain that some sort of fee should be paid. Referring to the lack of a specific bylaw, Reeve Nesbitt observed, "We made a mistake once. Let's hope we don't make the same mistake twice".

On a recorded vote, the motion to grant a building permit carried with only Mr. Jackson opposed. Mr. Muirhead, seconded by Mr. Higgins, then

proposed a motion to instruct the solicitor to draft a bylaw covering future towers. An annual fee, based on each 100 feet of height, would be charged; also, an initial fee would be required

before any tower could be built.

"It's too late to do anything about this application, but let's make sure we don't get caught again", said Mr. Muirhead. The motion carried.

## NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETING

SELECT COMMITTEE ON LAND DRAINAGE

By resolution of the Legislature of Ontario a select committee was appointed on June 30, 1972 to examine, study and inquire into the following matters regarding land drainage in Ontario:

- (1) The objectives of land drainage as an agricultural practice and the benefits to be derived from such practice.
- (2) The associated problems of competing land use in the urban fringe and in wetlands, as influenced by land drainage projects.
- (3) The problem of public interest in land use over the drainage of private lands by individuals.
- (4) The prior evaluation of the benefits and costs of a drainage project.
- (5) An evaluation of the petition procedure for initiating a drainage project.
- (6) A review of the construction improvement and maintenance procedures under "The Drainage Act" in achieving the objectives.
- (7) A review of the appeal procedures under "The Drainage Act".
- (8) A review of the financial procedures and assistance under "The Drainage Act" and other drainage programs.
- (9) A study of the costs of land drainage and what influences such costs and how they may be reduced, i.e. engineering costs, etc.
- (10) An evaluation of construction practices in general and erosion and weed control of drainage ditches in detail.
- (11) A review of the administrative practices and methods in carrying out responsibility under "The Drainage Act".

After due study and consideration to recommend such changes in the laws, procedures and processes as in the opinion of the Committee may be necessary and desirable.

The Committee has the intention of visiting all areas in the Province and to hold public hearings on the questions associated with the above terms of reference.

This therefore, is to invite all interested parties, individual or otherwise, to indicate to the Committee, by (AUGUST 15, 1972) their intention to submit written briefs or their desire to attend the hearings and make oral representations.

The response to this invitation will determine the times and places of hearings. A written notice setting out the time and place of the public hearings will be given as soon as possible to all persons who have filed notice of intention to make written or oral submissions.
