

STOUFFVILLE - Football has been dropped from the fall sports program at Stouffville Dist. Secondary School.

The decision, reached prior to the conclusion of the June Term, was revealed this week by J. H. Rehill, Staff Physical Education Director.

The reason? Lack of coaches, Mr. Rehill explained, members of staff with sufficient time to work with the teams.

The director said a minimum of two men were needed, and preferably three. Since schedules are arranged several months ahead, the league wanted an answer in May. Mr. Rehill said the whole football issue would be re-assessed when the matter comes up for revue in 1973.

While expressing regret at the sport's demise, the instructor said it would create no permanent vacuum in the school's athletic agenda. He mentioned tennis, volleyball and soccer as three main areas of interest that would be continued. He noted too, that cross-country competition had also become very 'big' at S.D.S.S.

Mr. Rehill said that for Stouffville to proceed with its football program, and then 'fold' midway through the season, would not be desireable. He said such a thing had occurred in one of the County schools last season.

The director praised the efforts of past coaches and managers. However, he feels that football, as a high school sport, is "on the way out". He said the trend was apparent in other areas. "It's no longer the glamor game it once was," he said.

"While the future of football at Stouffville High, and other secondary schools is uncertain, on one score Jim Rehill is sure - Hamilton 'Tiger Cats' will win the Grey Cup!
