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Pickering Township would re-organize planning board

PICKERING TWP. - A lengthy debate over re-structuring the Planning Board ended inconclusively at a recent meeting of Council's Executive Committee.

The matter was placed on the agenda by Councillor Don Quick, who described recent legislative changes affecting the membership of such boards. Previously, a majority of members had to be non-Council representatives, but the revisions to the provincial regulations now permit the majority to be made up of Councillors.

Mr. Quick maintained that reorganizing the Planning Board would improve its communications with Council.

Other members reacted cautiously to the proposal. Reeve John Williams felt the present system allowed "input" from citizens, and pointed out that Council still holds the final power over Board decisions.

Councillor Don Kitchen supported the idea of change, and suggested that Council members be appointed

when present terms expire. Councillor Jean MacPherson, though, felt it would be "unjust" to replace members of the Board in midstream, and Councillor Ken Matheson said that the present membership is representative of all areas in the municipality.

Township Manager Charles Shelley indicated that an attempt was being made to solve the problem of liaison between Council and the Planning Board. At its next meeting, he said, the Board will forward its minutes, and plans discussed at the meeting, for consideration by Council.

The discussion eventually dwindled, with no firm decision on Mr. Quick's suggestion.

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Release research documents on airport

STOUFFVILLE - Research documents promised the People or Planes Committee by Transport Minister Don Jamieson have been turned over to J.J. Robinette, Q.C., the Committee's counsel.

Mr. Jamieson had pledged that this research would be given to P.O.P. to assist it in preparing its case against expropriation before a federally-appointed hearing officer.

Two hundred documents dating back to 1967 are accompanied by a bridging paper explaining the chronological sequence of research by the Toronto Area Airports Project team.

The bridging paper places the many documents in their proper perspective as they were prepared over considerable time by groups working somewhat independently.

The Federal Expropriation Act also specifies that the Minister of Public Works make the research supporting Ottawa's position to build a second international airport at Pickering, available to those who oppose expropriation.

A full set of the documents will be available for study by interested members of the public at the Toronto Area Airports Project office, 241 Jarvis Street.

Hydro-Union squabble Pickering atomic plant

PICKERING TWP. - Charges by the striking Canadian Union of Public Employees, Local 1000, that Ontario Hydro has lost \$12 million in revenue from the Pickering nuclear plant, have been dismissed by Hydro Officials.

A management spokesman stated that a surplus of almost 1 million kilowatts has been produced since the strike began and some of this has been available for sale to neighboring American areas.

A press release from the Union stated that Hydro is losing energy sales of \$300,000 per day by allowing the nuclear plant to stand idle. This was termed "sheer irresponsibility". The Hydro spokesman stated, "Any power we produce at the Pickering Generating Station would be a lot more costly than that we are currently producing."

The Union's statement also claims that Ontario Hydro is paying "well over \$1,000 per week" to some of the engineers still on duty. No statement on this matter has been made public by Hydro.

Eight months for burglary

STOUFFVILLE - A young man arrested in Stouffville on July 8 has been sentenced to 8 months in jail.

Donald Jones, 19, of Uxbridge, appeared before Judge H.W. Jermyn in Whitby provincial court to plead guilty to seven offences. Among the charges were some involving burglaries in Uxbridge and Stouffville between June 14 and July 8.

When arrested, Jones attempted to escape from police, and ended up with an additional charge against him.
