The Anderson Haulage lads lost 3-0 to Oak Ridges, Thursday, ending the team's trek along the playoff trail. John Lennonville, or 'Mugsy' to his mates, turned in the finest pitching performance seen by a minor-leaguer here this season. His rising ball limited the local lads to routine pop-ups. Then, to give the plate umpire a little variety, he mixed in an occasional slider and change-up. Only Keith Acton could touch him for a safety - a double in the eighth. Up to then, he had been working on a no-hitter. The 'break in the ice', plus a walk to catcher Kevin Morley, put a little life in the Stouffville bench. However, both runners were left stranded. To face competition of this kind on the mound, was problem enough for Jack Watson and company. At the plate, however, he was equally potent, clouting a triple in the 4th. He was safe on an error in the 6th and socked a long fly ball that was gobbled up by Scott Connor in the 8th. 'Mugsy' romped home with two of his team's three tallies. Allan Heintzman scored the other, singled in by first baseman Tom Dukelow.

In going the 9-inning distance, Lennonville struck out 13 and walked two. He retired the Stouffville side in order in the 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th and 9th.
