Amazes kart-racing veterans

GOODWOOD - The National Go-Kart Races, at Goodwood Kartways on the holiday weekend, attracted 221 entries from across Canada and the northern United States.

One of the dramatic highlights of the races came when Kevin Barrick, R.R. 3, Stouffville, came within inches of pulling off what experienced observers considered "a miracle".
