## York member riles trustees

**YORK REGION** - Local MP John Roberts was the target of sharp criticism at a Board of Education meeting, Aug. 28.

Mr. Roberts had written to the Board, expressing his concern over the possibility that a fee of \$11 per hour would be charged for the use of school

facilities by community groups.

"It will have a crippling effect on the provision of sporting services to the young people of our area," predicted the MP. "It seems extremely unfortunate that as these facilities are available such high user fees are to be charged."

Communications on the same subject were received from the Councils of Whitchurch - Stouffville, Newmarket, King, Vaughan, and Aurora. These municipalities asked that the Board meet with them before settling any definite policy.

Trustee Merna Colbourne moved that the letters be referred to a Board committee currently studying this question. Trustee Bob Houghton, however, expressed annoyance over the letter from Mr. Roberts.

"He thinks that letter-writing solves all problems," observed Mr. Houghton. "This is away off-base and incorrect. It's unbelievable that he would write such a letter without checking his facts."

"I'll be glad to receive this letter," he concluded, "and I know where I'll file it."

Trustee Margaret Coburn, chairman of the committee, emphasized that no firm policy or fee has yet been established.

"What we are trying to do is not understood," she complained. "This is just a budget problem, and I hope we can make people realize this. We're concerned about sports and recreation facilities, but we have this budget problem."

"It's an election year," observed Chairman Ross Jolliffe.

"I'm starting to gain that impression," agreed Mrs. Coburn.

The motion to refer the letters was approved without further discussion.
