STOUFFVILLE
There is little reported change in attendance figures at Stouffville's three schools.

Principal Lorne Broadway says the enrollment at Summitview is down by about 30 to 339. At Orchard Park, Principal Keith Sutherland reports a similar trend with attendance down from 496 to 487.

St. Mark's Separate School is up somewhat, to 218, while the High School enrollment is 1,157. There are 375 Grades 7 and 8, and 782 in the secondary grades.
