Buttonville Airport expansion

Hold up approval until after public inquiry - suggests Mayor

BUTTONVILLE - In spite of a lengthy presentation by spokesmen representing Toronto Airways Limited, (Buttonville Airport), no immediate approval of a south-east runway extension, is contemplated by Markham Town Council.

This was the conclusion following a public hearing, Sept. 7, that lasted more than two hours.

Mayor Tony Roman, in his remarks, agreed with solicitor Donald Hindson that the announced inquiry into the new International Airport at Pickering should come first, before any decision was reached on expanding the smaller port site in Buttonville.

Mr. Roman said that noise created by planes using the Buttonville field, was already a very real problem for some local residents. He suggested that to expand this facility, could worsen the situation. He promised the ratepayers that proper notification would be authorized before the issue is placed on the Council agenda.

Councillor Roy Muldrew termed Mr. Hindson's suggestion that the Transport Department Hearing come first, "an excellent idea".

Councillor Bud Bonner said the thought of jet

passenger planes utilizing a site only five miles to the east, was of great personal concern when considering the Buttonville site.

Councillor Norm Tyndall said that both noise and traffic were problem issues in the Buttonville area.

The hearing chairman was councillor Murray Henderson.

Mr. Hindson, representing ratepayers, Mr. and Mrs. Rae McTavish, said a similar application had come before Council back in 1970, and had been rejected. The request, to extend one runway by 1,200 feet, thus requiring a change in zoning, was described as "a vicious type of spot rezoning", by the lawyer. He denied that such a facility was any boon to industry, but cited available serviced land as the only means to this end. He noted that while the \$13,000 received by the Town in municipal taxation each year might seem considerable, it was not so great when considered on the same basis as a sizeable industry.

Opposition to the project, while representing only about half of the persons present, was strong in its stand.

F. R. Hume, R.R. 1, Unionville, said the people were "stuck with an airport", but could live with it, if the present-day use was not changed. "If the air traffic flow increases," he said, "it will be a terrible place to live."
