and Mrs. Murison celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary and were treated to a horse and buggy ride across the farm orchard. The steed and rig, supplied by Leslie Beare, a close friend

and neighbor, helped close the gap of 50 years. Gordon handled the reins with extreme skill, while his wife participated in a little side-seat driving. Such was the occasion - an afternoon filled with many fond memories, all shared with the dozens of folks who came to call.

Gordon Murison was born on the homestead farm, Passmore Avenue, Scarboro, the son of James and Keturah Murison. His grandfather, William Murison purchased the property in 1875, coming to Ontario from Scotland.

Mrs. Murison is the daughter of William and Agnes Lotton, Dunbarton. She attended Dunbarton Public School. Mr. Murison went to Hillside.

The beautiful farm, with its immaculate grounds and excellent crops, has been 'home' all their married life. Some of the trees that surround the house were planted by Mr. Murison himself.

The couple are justly proud of their family, that includes sons, Bill, Jim and John, all of R.R.1, Markham; George of Omeme, and daughters, Isobel (Mrs. Wm. Russell), Scarboro; Aileen (Mrs. Frank Robb), West Hill, and Audrey, at home. There are 16 grandchildren.

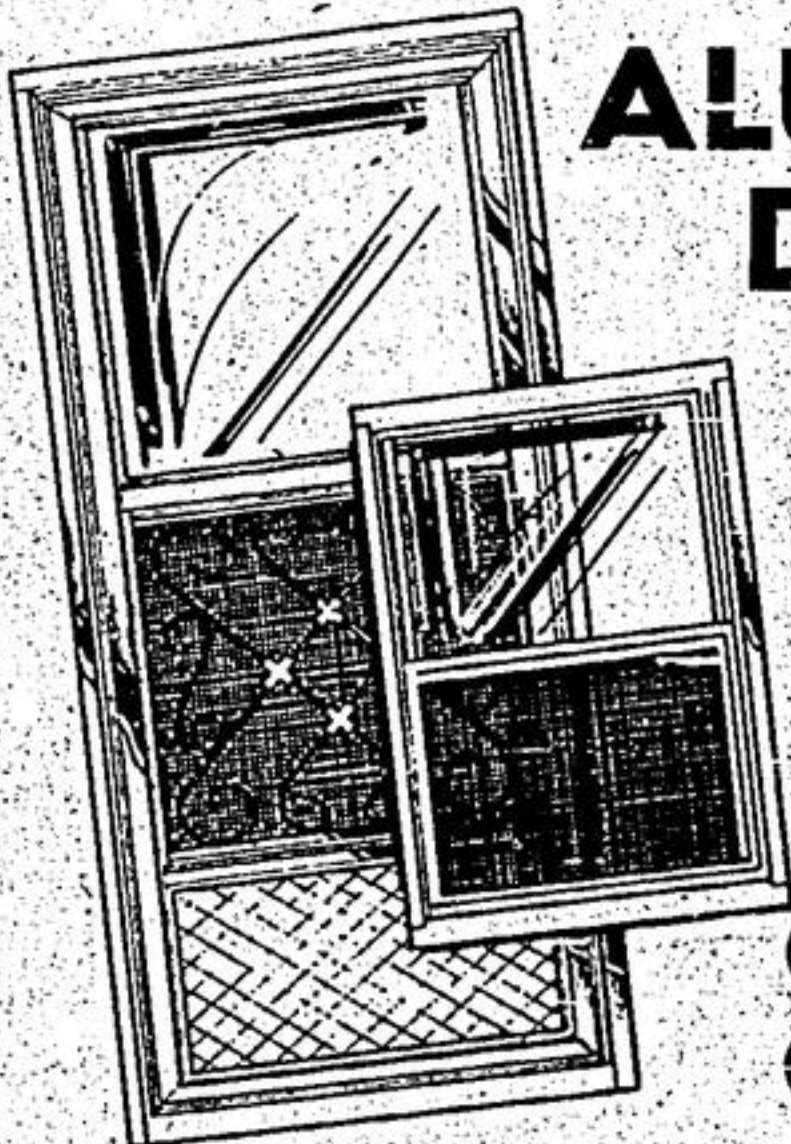

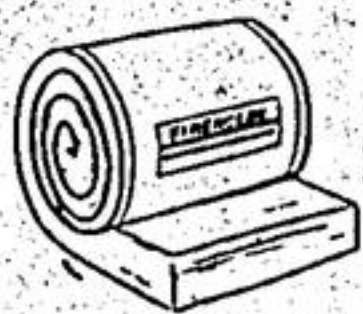

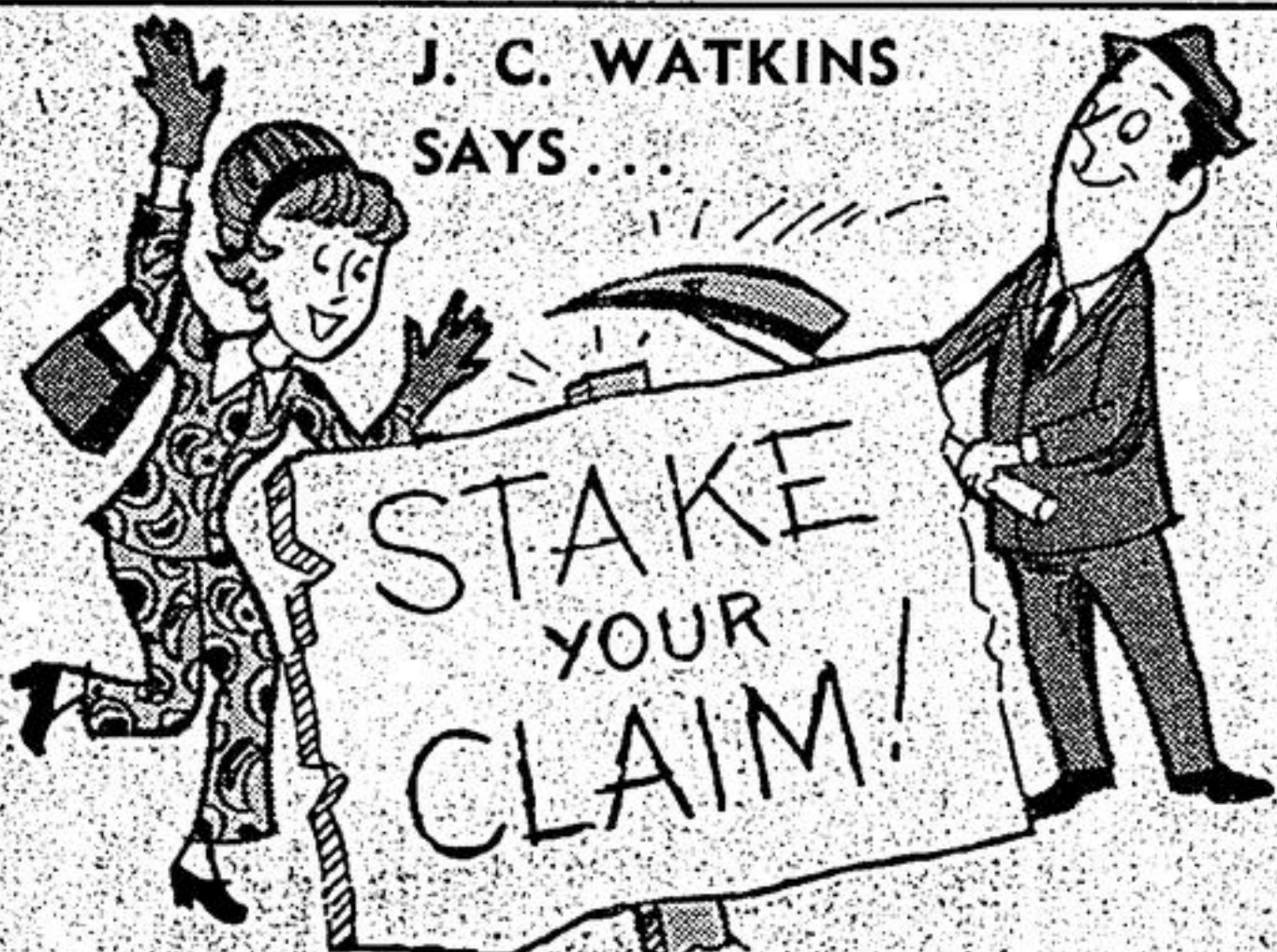
