GOODWOOD - If the current one established along the same corridor. "Why mess up the rest of the countryside," he said, "go where you have to go eventually".

Councillor Clark Muirhead said all members were unanimously opposed to route Alternate 'A', and had indicated such preference. And these included not only Hydro spokesmen, but members of Uxbridge Twp. Council; the chairman of Planning Board, and the listening audience.

Alternate route 'A', the meeting was told, would take the line east from Newmarket, through the north section of Whitchurch-Stouffville, into Uxbridge Twp., then south, into Pickering and east to Oshawa.

Alternate route 'B' would extend the line south from Newmarket, 'slicing' through a section of Vandorf, on into Markham, then east to Cherrywood.

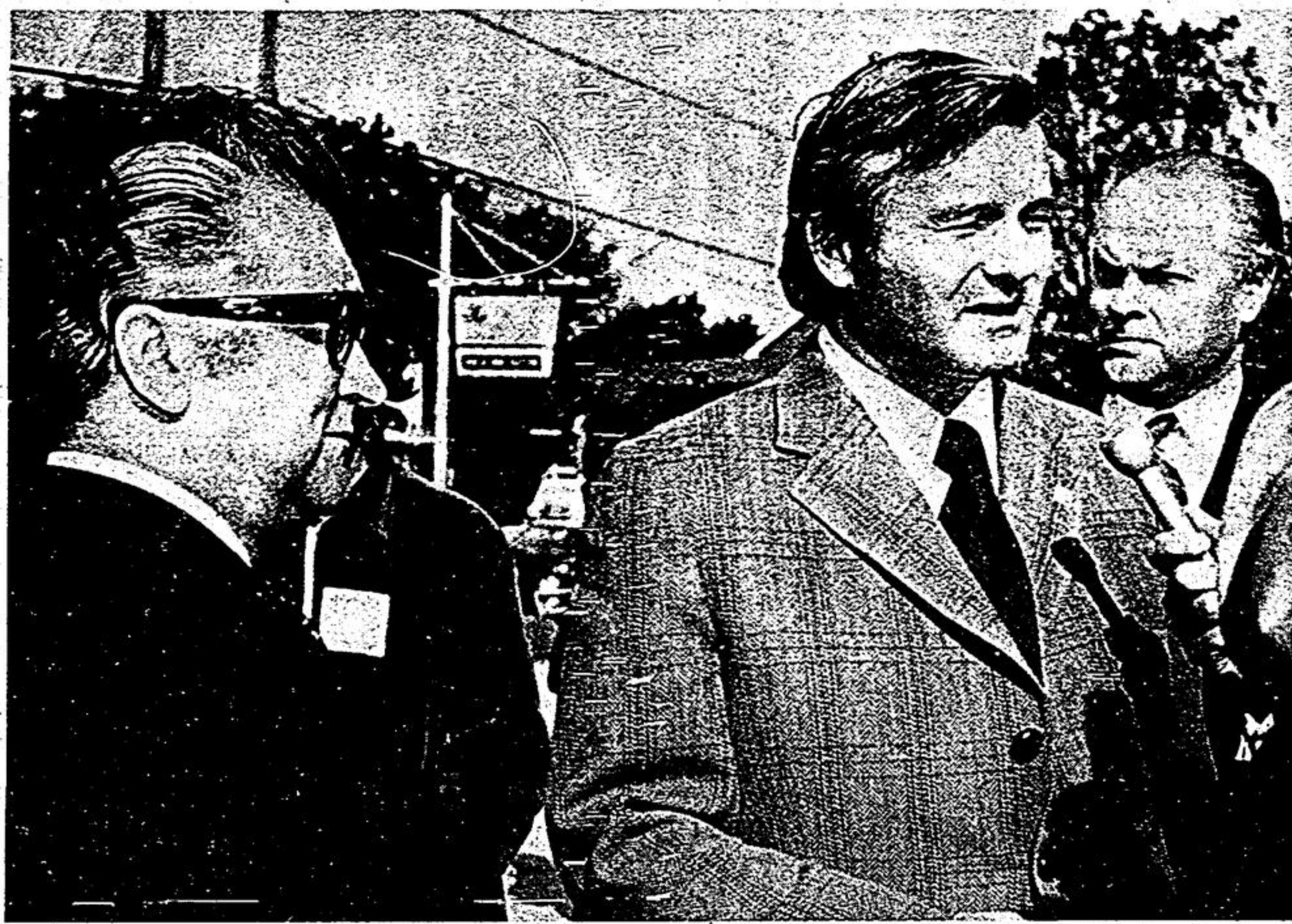
Uxbridge councillor Frank Hendy noted that an auxiliary line was proposed for an area south of Newmarket, parallel to Hwy. 404, in the year 1980, so it seemed only practical to have the

Hydro representative, Robt. Murray said nothing 'in writing' had been received by them.

Solicitor Alex McLellan said he planned to attend the Friday session of the Soland Commission Hearing, and present the report personally.

Mr. Murray explained that it was impossible to expand the service, "without causing hurt or disruption to some people". He said the general policy was to acquire needed properties, then lease them back to abutting owners for \$1 per acre per year plus taxes, in an effort to keep it under cultivation and keep Hydro out of the weed business.

Valley land dumping blamed on Town

MARKHAM Residents, attending a public hearing, into the proposed extension of Bullock Drive, easterly to Main Street, Sept. 28, sidetracked Markham Planning Committee onto another issue, seemingly just as

important to them as the original subject. Their objection concerned garbage refuse that had been dumped into a section of valley lands, north of Robinson Street.

"There's pretty poor housekeeping in the area", commented solicitor Paul Mingay.

Bruce Conally, president of the 'Save our Valley Association', also referred to it. "The Town had done little to enhance the property by dumping rubble into it", he observed.

"Do you see any possibility of preventing the valley from being filled in; bit by bit?" asked Mr. Mingay. "Every day there are trucks from

this municipality illegally filling the ravine - this is reprehensible conduct. I would like to see it stop."

Town Planning Director, Bill Power said his department had no knowledge of such incidents.

Henderson said it would be checked out. Councillor Harold Lawrie denied that any dumping had occurred in the area for over a year. He said the refuse now there would be cleaned up as time allowed.
