 Mrs. Clarence Bass has returned from a visit with her brothers and sisters-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Art Ollivier of New

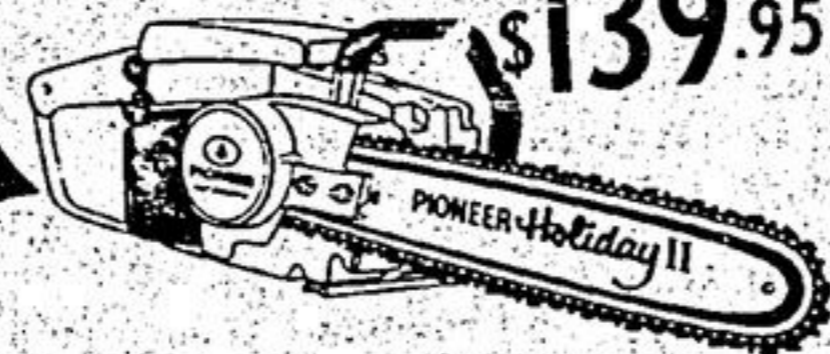
