

Auto straddles tracks

STOUFFVILLE Recently, a surprised motorist was jolted into the realization that he had not been driving on a continuation of Sunset Boulevard, when his car soared off the 3' banking from the Testa Villa parking lot onto the railroad tracks.

The accident brought into focus the danger of that unprotected area along the C.N. line.

Since then, a "Dead End" sign has been posted, at the entrance to the parking lot, facing Sunset, and a temporary barrier set up.

The apartment developer's plan agreement calls for tree screening along the track side.

M.P. John Roberts - a personable man

STOUFFVILLE - If the ladies manning the campaign "Coffee House" on Stouffville's Main Street reflect the dedication and persuasiveness of their candidate, then Liberal MP, John Roberts, will be starting his second term as federal representative for York-Simcoe next month.

When The Tribune approached the Liberal ladies for an interview with their man, they set it up efficiently and served up a verbal resume of his attributes with the tea and cookies.

Later, when Mr. Roberts arrived at his Newmarket headquarters, volunteers there were spreading the Liberal philosophy.

There is no denying the personal rapport between candidate and followers.

And John Roberts is a personable man. He talks easily and casually to campaign workers, constituents and the press.

"I was up at 5:30 this morning," he said and indicated his appointment board, jam-packed with campaign commitments.

He showed no sign of weariness, or edginess from weeks of sustained political debate that puts an incumbent candidate in a vulnerable defensive position.

"This campaign is entirely different from the one in '68. It was more serious and on a higher level," he volunteered and added that live national issues that should be the source of debate this year had been devitalized by 'nit-picking'.

During his 4 1/2 years in Ottawa, John Roberts considers the support of the government over the War Measures Act his most difficult single decision. He could think of no legislation, during his time in

office, that he would like to see reversed.

"Home, in Ottawa, is an apartment with a share with parliamentary colleagues.

Home in York-Simcoe riding is a quiet place next to the cemetery in King City.

When he has the opportunity, Mr. Roberts enjoys playing squash, watching movies, attending Ottawa Arts Centre and reading. Most of all, he looks forward to being home, talking and relaxing with his wife Beverley and step-daughter Eden.

"I find it easy to relax," he said quietly, amid the clatter of campaign headquarters. "I'm relaxing talking to you

right now."

If John Roberts wins the York-Simcoe election, he is sure to accept the news calmly.

Along at the Main Street 'Coffee House' there is bound to be a rousing cheer from his supporters, and the hard-working ladies there should be permitted a final "We told you so."
