## Bethel Assembly of God

### Church dedicated

RINGWOOD — It may be startling for anyone used to the passive rituals of a denominational church service to be present at the informal, exuberant expression of faith that is an integral part of worship at the Bethel Assembly of God.

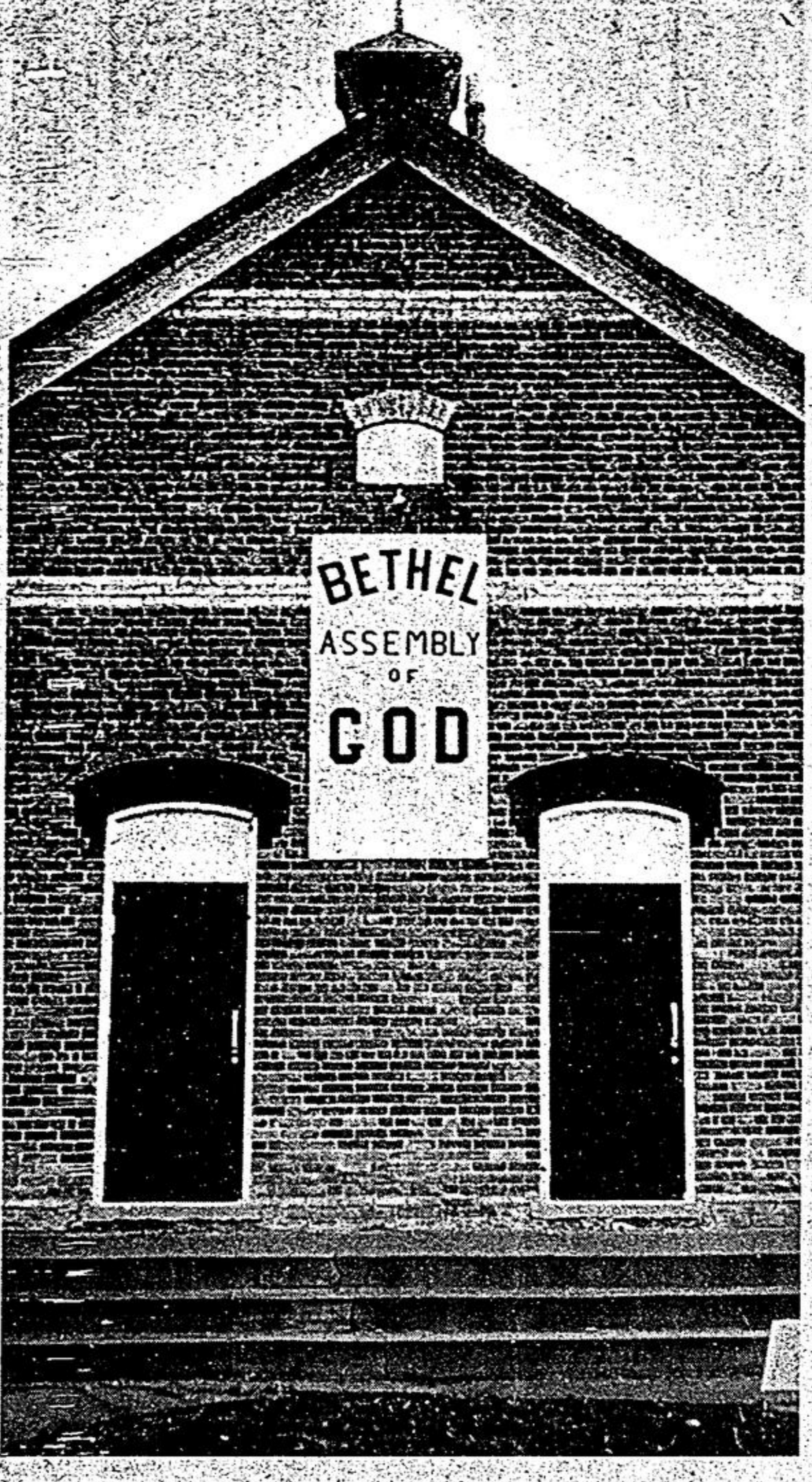
On Sunday, Oct. 22, over 130 brethren swelled the former Ringwood school to capacity at a celebration dedicating the building as the church's sanctuary. And celebration, not service, is the operative word in this church whose religion, its pastor, Rev. A. Minaker, describes as one of "song and joy".

The Ringwood congregation is an outgrowth of work which started 15 years ago in Claremont and progressed to Stouffville. The church has been active in town for 8 years and worship was held in the Masonic Hall prior to moving to Ringwood. The former school was purchased by public auction, from the York County Board of Education, when Rev. Minaker joined

the congregation in 1971. Arthur Starr, representing the Board at the dedication celebration, complimented the congregation on the remodelling work they had done on the premises. "Many years ago the one-room school was used during the week for education and on Sunday for church service. It's appropriate that this building should become a church", he commented.

Councillor Gordon Ratcliff conveyed the best wishes of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville. Youth was well represented in the congregation and the pastor's daughter, Marilyn, expressed their philosophy in her remark that it was "good to be alive and vibrant with God".

In dedicating the church, Rev. Minaker offered his thanks to the hard working members of his congregation, but concluded that there was only one hero "God be the glory great things he has done".

## THE TOWN OF WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETING

A public meeting will be held by the Planning Committee of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, as noted above, to consider proposed amendments no. 3 and no. 4 to the Official Plan of the Township of Whitchurch whereby it is the intent of Council to:

1. Consider proposed amendment no. 3 to the Official Plan of the Township of Whitchurch which designates from "Rural" to "Industrial" land on the south-east corner of the Don Mills Road and Regional Road 15 intersection. The subject site, extends along the southern boundary of Regional Road 15, from the abovementioned intersection easterly to lands presently designated "Industrial" a depth of approximately 664 feet, and is located on part lot 20, concession 4 in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville.
2. Consider proposed amendment no. 4 to the Official Plan of the Township of Whitchurch which designates: (a) from "Hamlet" to "Industrial" land formerly known as the Vandorf Public School site. The subject site, approximately 3.5 acres in area, is located on part lot 16, concession 4 west of the railway, in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville. (b) from "Rural" to "Industrial" land immediately north of the abovementioned school site, and abutting the railway tracks on the west. The subject site, approximately 12.5 acres in area is located on part lot 17, concession 4, in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville.

You are invited to attend the meeting and to state your support or objection to the proposed amendments. Should you be unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the meeting. The amending documents may be examined at the Clerk's office, Municipal Building, Stouffville, during regular business hours.

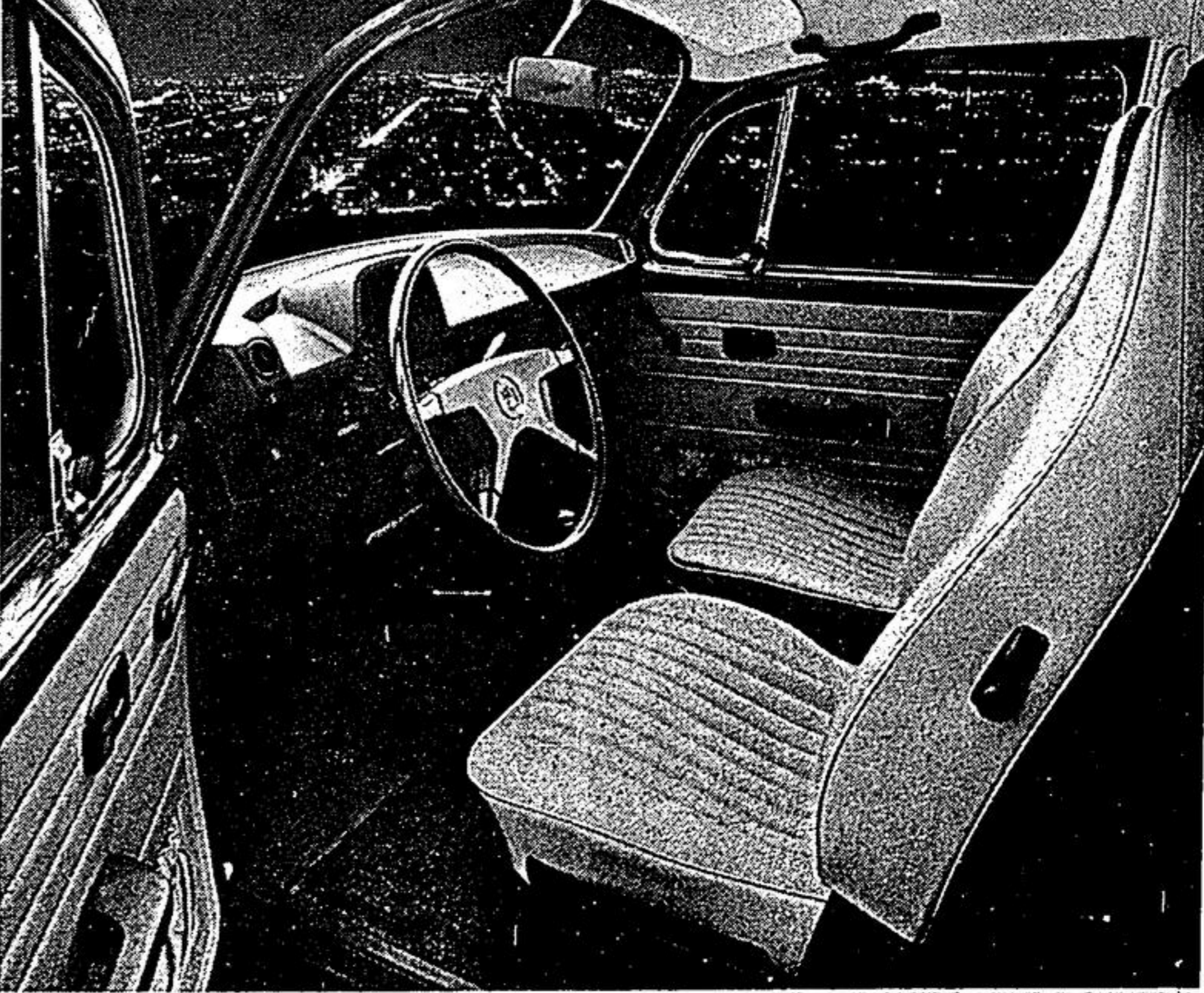
## I'm switching

## Hunger strike to help hungry

STOUFFVILLE — On Tuesday, twenty-five pupils at Stouffville Secondary School went on strike, with the full approval of their teacher. In fact, she joined them. Mrs. Marilyn Pickford and girls in her year 4 home economics class went on a hunger strike, for more than 24 hours, in aid of Oxfam. The idea germinated through class study on world nutrition. One student, Heather Connelly, who completed a project on the Oxfam organization, received information on its fund-raising programs. A prolonged food fast, with sponsorship for each hour without food, sounded like an appropriate sacrifice for home ec. students to make. Each participant was required to have a sheet signed by some responsible person after every waking hour of the hunger strike, which ended at 2:45 p.m., Wednesday. Denise Gibson, who collected the greatest number of sponsors, should raise about \$105, and the group's anticipated total donation to Oxfam is \$500.
