Uxbridge Township

Voters confused

UXBRIDGE TWP. - Council agreed, Nov. 6, that computerized notification cards should be sent out to residents in the Township, before the municipal elections in December.

"It is almost mandatory to have something like this so people know, not only where vote but, in which direction they should go to vote," stated Reeve Bob Nesbitt and pointed to the confusion that's created, especially with two elections close together, when polling areas are not similar. "Why can't we have standardization of polling areas?" he concluded.

Council agreed that the Clerk should write to the Federal Deputy returning officer and request that he bring federal polls in Uxbridge Township into line with the number and boundaries of polls

used for municipal and provincial election purposes.

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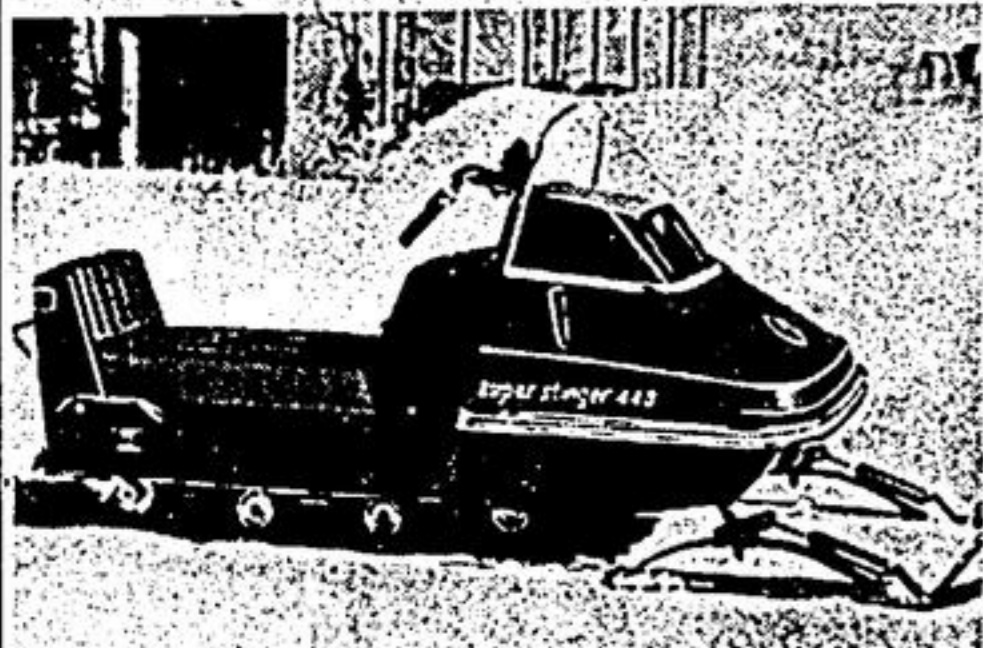
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
