## Ask Unionville's 'character' be preserved

**UNIONVILLE** — Retaining the character and charm of old Unionville is one target aimed at by Markham Planning Committee by means of a revised zoning bylaw.

Bob Martindale, Planning Technician for the Town of Markham, said the revision will give Unionville greater control of its development.

The bylaw revisions will be especially advantageous to those people with non-commercial interests. On the other hand, said Bose, businesses are opposed to the move because it will pose limitations on expansion.

Art Grimes of Unionville said, "The only reason I moved here was for its charm". Unionville is one of the last remaining historical villages near Toronto.

Bose said there would be no allowances made for off-street parking because it would take away from the street's appearance.

Charles Maynard, Secretary-Treasurer of Unionville Motors, commented, "I would hate to hell to see Unionville chopped-up".

According to Ron Bose, the transitional bylaw should be passed by the end of the year.
