Ballantrae Study should occupy planning priority

Dear Sir:

On reading your Nov. 2, issue, I was much disturbed by Town Council's consideration of yet another plan for spot rezoning for subdividing in the Ballantrae area. It is my understanding that an approved Official Town Plan does exist for this area and this spot rezoning is contrary in every way to that Plan. The function of a Town Plan is to provide Planning Board and Council with a sense of predetermined direction, and variance from this plan should be the extreme exception rather than the rule, as recently demonstrated.

therefore suggest that in any future plan for development, the builder be required to provide services. It is well known that much of the land in this Town could be purchased by developers for future subdividing. Council has a moral obligation first to protect the best interests of its residents, before the interests of the developers.

Claremont, and then by horse and wagon, or wheelbarrow to his home. It might have cost him \$125 a ton, but then, who cares about expense?

Hydro 'set-back'

STOUFFVILLE Hope for area conservationists and, particularly, residents in Vandorf, was regenerated, Nov. 2, by Dr. Omond Soland's announcement that the three alternative routes, pushed by Ontario Hydro for its 500,000-volt power line from Nanticoke to Pickering, may be rejected.

Dr. Soland's preliminary report recommends a further environmental study and he is quoted as saying, "the chances of finding a better

route are so high, I think we ought to look at it again."

The new Study will probably begin early in December and take longer than four months to complete. The main purpose is to consider public opinion, and workshops will be held in different communities in which local politicians, planning experts and concerned citizens will be invited to participate.

The additional study is expected to cost between \$100,000 to \$200,000.
