## Milk cows in demand

The milk business is a lot different than it used to be. It's worth looking at some recent changes and current conditions.

The butterfat differential has been raised to seven and eight cents for fluid and industrial milk, respectively.

All producers were given a 6.4 percent increase in Market Share Quota Sept. 1.

Producers needing more Market Share Quota can get it free by applying to the Marketing Board, and guaranteed bank loans are available for quota and cows.

Quota prices are down to around \$16 for Group 1 and three quarters of a cent per pound for market share with subsidy.

Demand for dairy cattle of all breeds is strong with good prices. Production of industrial milk is slipping back a little each year, and neither surpluses nor American imports threaten.

Last month's blend price for industrial milk was 4.61 which isn't bad as a surplus price, if a producer has enough subsidy quota to add \$1.25 to a good portion of it. However, if he hasn't even market share to cover it, \$1.50 is taken off, and the price then is ridiculous.

A final point is that milk pipelines have been installed in large numbers of barns here in York in the last while. They make a big difference in the work

end of it, ease the labour problem and can open the door to expansion.

I think this all adds up to dairymen being able to plan positively right now. A few more cows can be added, money spent on quota, (even at \$16) can be justified, and some capital improvements to save labour can be made.

Little changes are easy, but even big ones can be made with fair assurance of stability in the future. The big ones I think will be handling roughage feed in a form that can be blown into a silo and fed out by pushing two buttons; and the other one will be a system where the man doing the milking can do his thing standing up comfortably in a parlour instead of squatting down between cows in stanchions.

Records on production are a necessity too, to make sure that every space has a cow in it, pulling her weight. D.H.I. and R.P.O. are both practical, on a once a month basis. D.H.I. also has an extra service now to help dairymen buy good cows when they need them. Jim Ball and Les Meyers at Uxbridge, and Ray Castator at Kleinburg all have full information on dispersals across the province to find cows with good records.
