


Choir concert pleases crowd

Handicapped children learn to ride

STOUFFVILLE Harriett Lahman is a happy 11-year-old who loves to ride horses - not an unusual enthusiasm for a

young girl. But Harriett is not a 'usual' equestrienne. She will never be able to saddle her horse, tighten the girths, place her foot in the stirrup and swing into the saddle.

Harriett is severely handicapped - a victim of cerebral palsy and brain damaged from birth.

She is one of 35 children and 12 adults who take part in a program offered by C.A.R.D., the Community Association for Riding for the Disabled, an organization which has been active in the Stouffville area for 3 years.

Three mornings a week and Monday evening, handicapped participants arrive, by bus, at Shadow Creek Farms, 7th line, south of Hwy 47, to ride their mounts around the

indoor arena. There are 6 horses, specially chosen for their quiet temperament, in the C.A.R.D. stable; riding instructors who supervise the lessons are all volunteers; as are the Executive Board of Directors, physiotherapists and organizational help who come from all over Metro and surrounding townships.

In 1971, C.A.R.D. raised \$14,000 in donations to finance its therapy program, which costs the organization \$192 per year for each rider.

Volunteers are in constant attendance during the riding sessions. Four assistants help patients with mounting and dis-mounting and handlers lead the horses at all times.

Participants range in age from 6 to 72.

Riding gives some the incentive to use every responsive nerve and muscle; it helps to improve balance, muscular control and mental stimulation, and the outings benefit all, emotionally and socially.

On Nov. 25, C.A.R.D. held its 2nd 'Mini

Royal' at Shadow Creek Farm, to demonstrate its work with the handicapped and raise funds for the continuation of the program.

Harriett Lahman rode in this event and her obvious delight in participating was ample acknowledgment of the success of C.A.R.D.'s efforts.

"The program is tremendous," enthused Harriett's father, Stephen Lahman of Don Mills, and commented on the volunteers working in the organization. "The effort these people make is phenomenal. Harriett can't participate in many sports and riding has become meaningful to her."

Jim Elder, of Canada's equestrian team, judged the action at the 'Mini Royal'.

Harriett Lahman was awarded a Blue Ribbon.
