STOUFFVILLE - The Stouffville Badminton Club, with a membership of 20 players, including about 10 students, is requesting financial support, to carry on its program, Monday evenings, in the High School auditorium. Noel Storry, past president of the organization, attended a meeting of the Whitechurch - Stouffville Recreation Committee, Dec. 14. Mr. Storry said the rate had been established at \$6 per night plus a \$3 permit fee and cost of equipment. He said that while non-students would be willing to pay a set membership, he hardly thought it fair to charge the same rate to students. The season, he said, extends from October through May. In the discussion that followed, the Committee agreed that a Club membership fee should be established. It was recommended too, that to qualify for a grant, a 1973 budget should be submitted in January and dealt with by the finance committee.

Can't license rural cats

STOUFFVILLE - At a recent meeting, representatives of 5 regional municipalities - Whitechurch, Stouffville, Newmarket, King, East Gwillimbury and Aurora, met to discuss and assess the Humane Society's animal control services in each area. Councillor Betty vanNostrand reported back to Council, Nov. 28, that East Gwillimbury, in particular, had voiced dissatisfaction with the service. "We have received very few complaints and payments for sheep damage are no higher than in the past, so I couldn't find any objection to the work the Humane Society are doing for us". Mrs. vanNostrand commented that, after discussion, each municipality decided it did not wish to set up its own 'control' facilities, and this left two alternatives - have the Humane Society continue with the complete service; employ a municipal animal control officer and retain the use of the Society's shelter. There was also discussion of 5 municipalities 'amalgamating' to get a better rate from the Humane Society. However, it was thought one might get better service than the other and that it would not be 'financially feasible'. Mrs. vanNostrand reported a lengthy discussion on the licensing of cats. "I took it lightly, but Aurora didn't. I pointed out to them that licensing of cats in urban areas was different to rural ones where you will get flack from some farmer with 20 or so cats in a barn". A further look at animal control problems will be taken at a meeting, scheduled for Dec. 14.
