

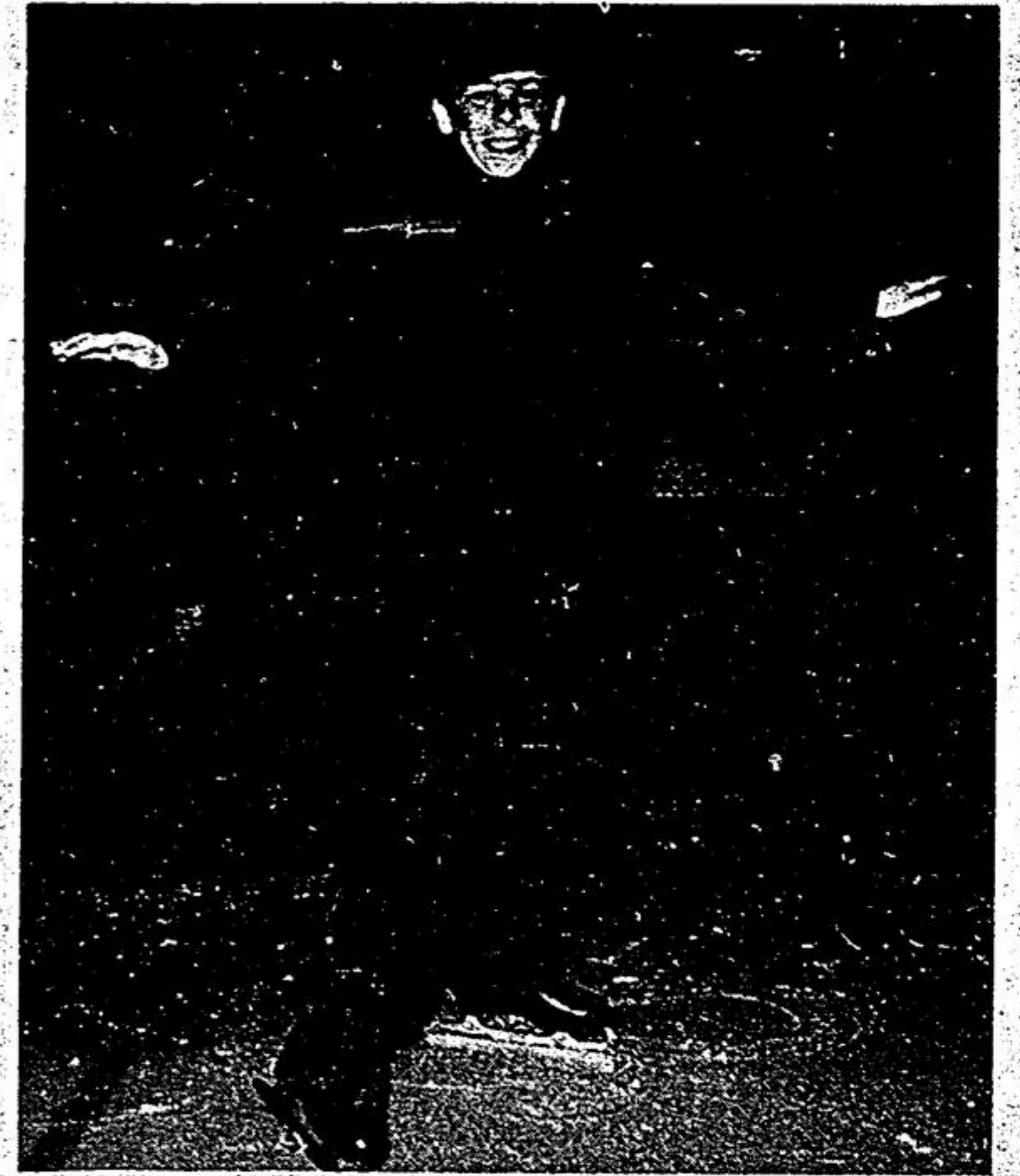
Pictures recall the top news events of 1972

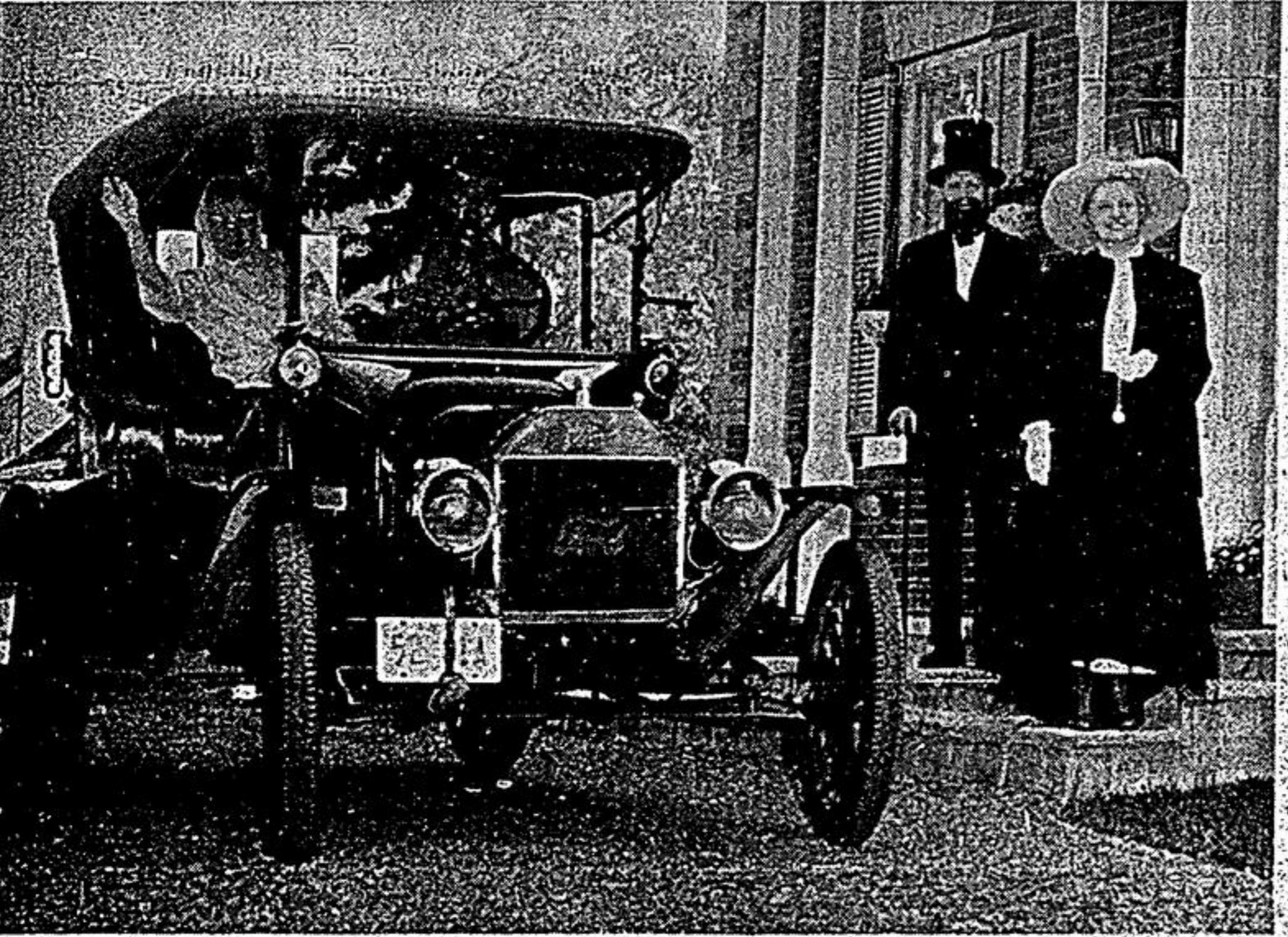
Stouffville's new Community Hall, presented to the town by Arthur Latham, was officially opened, July 1.

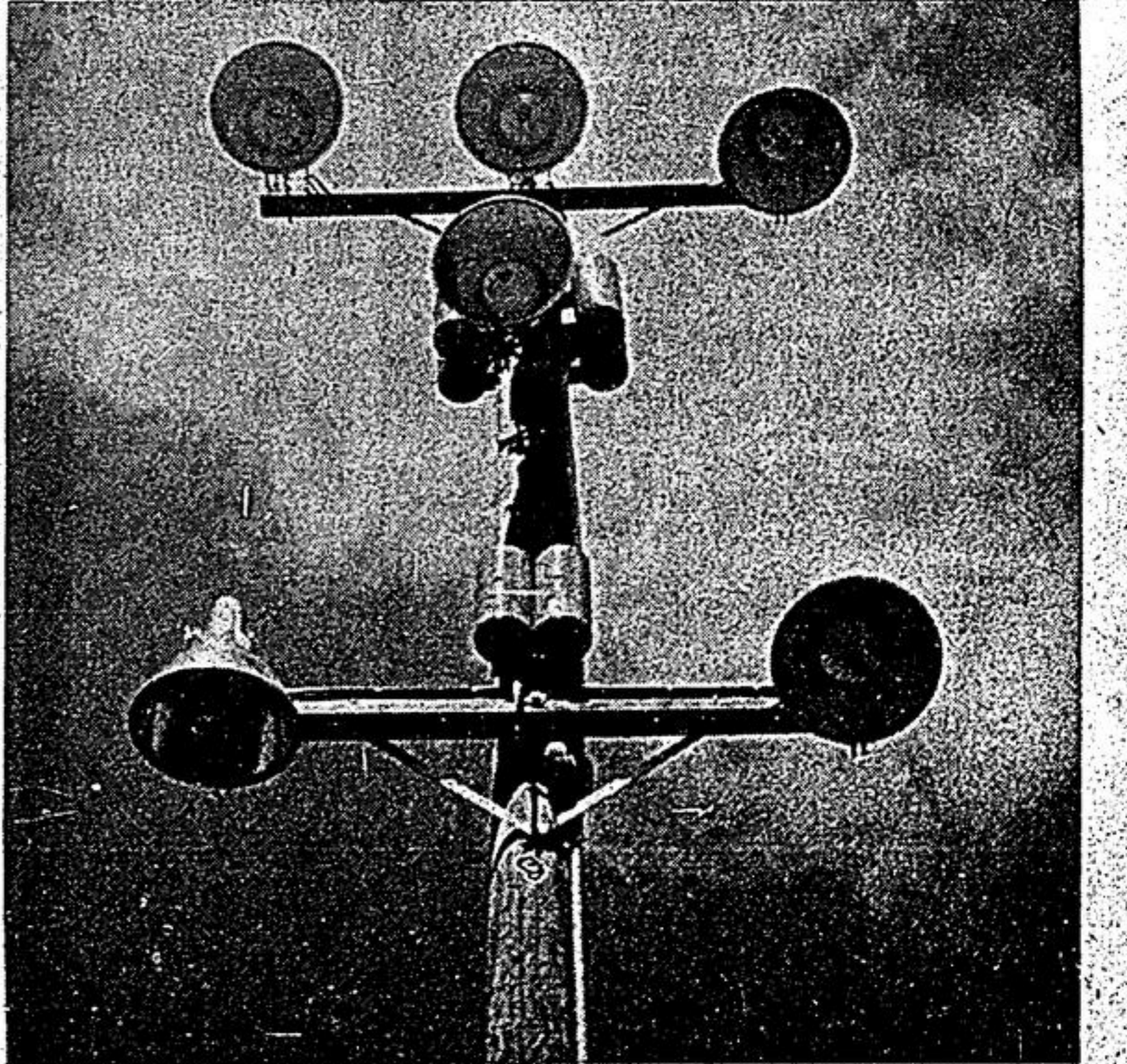

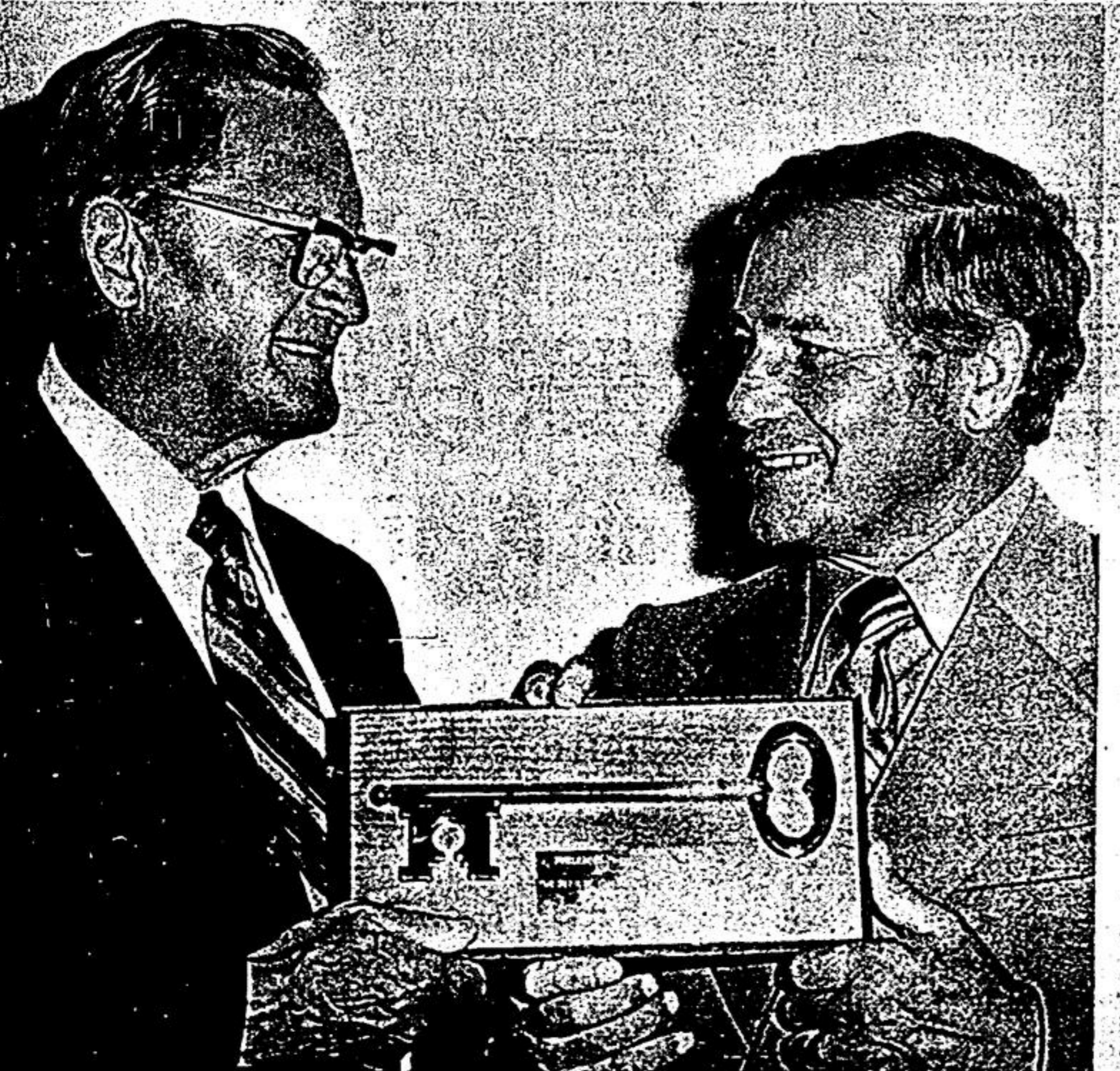
