Bethesda Rd. residents lose works yard fight

The town's new public works yard will be located on Bethesda Road, just west of Hwy. 48, Whitchurch-Stouffville council decided Tuesday afternoon.

That's despite a lot of opposition from neighbours in the vicinity of the new operations centre site, as it's called.

During the environmental assessment process to select the site, four public meetings were held.

Forty residents showed up for the fourth meeting in November and not one supported the site.

"This facility belongs in a light industry area," said Terry O'Connor at Tuesday's council meeting.

He lives on a 30-acre farm near the site.

Dr. O'Connor wondered what would happen to the rest of the street, lined with farms and residential areas, once the operations centre is built.

The Bethesda Road site was chosen because it had the least impact on the environment, residents heard at the fourth public meeting.

The site chosen had "no

natural features to be concerned with," Paula Neto, a consultant with Totten Sims Hubicki Associates, said.

At the public meeting, people expressed concerns the new works yard could pollute their wells, increase traffic, create noise and light pollution and affect their property values.

"I am satisfied that the environmental and residential impact will be minimal," Councillor Susanne Hilton said at Tuesday's meeting.

The report prepared for the environmental assessment will be filed with the Ministry of the Environment and be available for public review for 30 days.

The current works yard property at 5827 Main St. will be part of a parcel land that will be home to a new fire hall and a multi-purpose facility, which will include twin ice pads and other facilities.
