If necessary, Game 5 would be played tonight in Port Perry and Game 6 Saturday at 6:10 p.m. in Stouffville.


Minor midgets down 2-0 heading for Cobourg

Spartan girls drop York Region final

Newmarket's Sacred Heart Crusaders claimed their second York Region Athletic Association varsity girls hockey championship Tuesday with a 3-2 victory over the Stouffville District Secondary School Spartans before a boisterous crowd at Stouffville Arena.

Alex Elkerton received credit for the winning goal when a Stouffville defenceman inadvertently banked a pass in off the Spartans' netminder to break a 2-2 tie early in the third period.

Goals by Ann Marie Lewis and Kiely Barnett rounded out the Sacred Heart offence.

Heather Hughes and Vanessa Spataro scored for Stouffville.

Claiming the title, the Crusaders knocked off the previously unbeaten Spartans after ending

the Markham Marauders' unbeaten season in the semifinal playoff series.

It was the third straight season the Spartans have been league finalists. They lost to Markham in last year's final.

Stouffville is two-time defending Ontario Federation of School Athletic Associations champs in the A/AA division.

The only year they won York Region, in 2005, they lost the OFSAA final.

"Hopefully, that bodes well," Stouffville head coach Brian Shankman said. "But hats off to Sacred Heart. They played real well and won."

The large crowd may have rattled the Spartans, he said.

"The girls were jittery, with all the fans there, and got off their game," he said. A disallowed goal didn't help.

"In the girls' minds, the game was tied," he said.

And from the other bench?

"I think our girls wanted it more," said Crusaders' head coach Rob Adduono. "We're more teamoriented this year. I think that's why we were successful."

Both teams are headed for OFSAA championships in Pembroke next month.

Sacred Heart will play in the AAA/AAAA grouping for larger schools.

Stouffville will re-group after March break and play exhibition games with Uxbridge Secondary, which is going to the OFSAA AAA/AAA tourney.

"We should be highly ranked at OFSAA," Shankman said. "We won't be sneaking up on anyone."
