CELEBRATION OF THE ARTS

John-Michael Scapin has advice for you. The Aurora student won York Region's Celebration of the Arts talent search in 2004, which he said

helped prepare him for a national reality TV talent competition.

When giving advice about entering the York Region talent competition, the 17-year-old sounds a bit like a Nike ad.

"Do it. Don't worry. Have fun. It is a great experience. You won't regret it," he said.

Mr. Scapin won his \$1,500 bursary after singing Good Morning Baltimore, while playing the piano. "It was fabulous. I had friends compet-

ing," he said. "It was a whole summer of meeting people. It opened doors." It was his first time in the competition. His bursary paid for piano and sing-

> ing lessons. "It was a big stepping stone and a real learning experience," he recalled.

Mr. Scapin, chosen by a panel of judges for his singing, dancing and acting talent, won a \$150,000 scholarship that allows him to study at a top theatrical training school anywhere in the world.

> Triple Sensation did well with critics, but, by the time people tuned in, the show was already quite far along, Mr. Scapin said, adding it cer

tainly did not reach Canadian Idol fame.

But Triple Sensation was more about education than fame. Did Celebration of the Arts help him prepare for Triple Sensation?

"Yes. Anything on stage helps."

York's chambers of commerce and boards of trade donated \$5,000 to Celebration of the Arts.

Entertainers from the competition, including singers, dancers and players of instrumental solos and duets performed at an event the group hosted during last fall's Canadian Chamber of Commerce convention in Markham.

"They did such an outstanding job. The per-

formers were incredible.

"It enhanced the success of the conference," said Mac Cosburn, chairperson of the committee hosting the event.

This year's Celebration of the Arts competition will be complete by Labour Day.

Semifinals are in July and the finals in August. The gala is in October at Markham Theatre for Performing Arts, which is when the bursaries are given out.

Make sure what you choose is appropriate for your age, the president of Marquee Productions and producer of Celebration of the Arts said.

"It does not make sense for an eight-year-old to enter with a love song about a man. It happens all the time. They hear the song on the radio," Ms Amirault said.

Celebration of the Arts is the brainchild of York Region Media Group publisher Ian Proudfoot.
