Another Wise leads Spartans through perfect round-robin

Stouffville District Secondary School will not three-peat as provincial high school girls hockey champions, but the Spartan boys are still on track to repeat.

In the A/AA boys event in the Ottawa area, defending champion Stouffville advanced to today's semifinals with its fifth straight win, a 5-0 decision over Holy Cross of St. Catharines Friday afternoon.

Sam Carrick had a shorthanded goal and two assists to lead Stouffville.

"Our best game of the tournament," Stouffville coach Jamie Hewitt said. "We just weren't crisp before this. Today, all three lines were going and we were crisp."

Stouffville plays the winner of Sacred Heart (Walkerton)-Timmins in a semifinal at 9 a.m. today. The winner goes to the gold-medal game at 2:15 p.m., the loser to the game for bronze at 2:30.

The Spartans rode Jamie Wise's hot stick to a 4-0-0 round-robin record and a berth in playoffs.

The Grade 11 student, whose big brother Brendan starred when Stouffville won OFSAA a year ago, had 10 points, including eight goals, to lead all scorers in both divisions in the round-robin.

His brother played Jr. A for North York this year. Their father, Graham Wise, is head hockey coach at Ryerson University in Toronto.

Jamie had four goals in Stouffville's 5-2 win over Toronto Forest Hill Thursday. Stouffville completed the round-robin Thursday night with a 7-4 win over Holy Trinity of Kanata.

Brother Andre of Markham, with Stouffville residents on its roster, made last night's AAA/AAA quarterfinals by going 2-0-2 in the round-robin.

Semifinals and finals in both boys' divisions will be played today at the Sensplex in Kanata. The Ottawa area's first four-rink complex, it is the practice facility of the NHL Senators.




