## Legion for new home

War vets, homeowners displaced for new road

The Stouffville Royal Canadian Legion is looking for a new home and the veterans are upset.

There's no definite date when the 60-year-old building will be demolished to accommodate the jog elimination on Ninth Line, but Mayor Wayne Emmerson would like to see construction of the new stretch of road begin in 2010.

Local veterans are not happy, legion president Murray Pattenden said, adding "it is their building. But they also know things happen and times change."

Moving will be particularly difficult for the charter members who helped build the hall six decades ago, said Mr. Pattenden, who is doubly impacted by the plan.

His is one of the seven homes affected, along with Earl Hoover Machine & Welding Ltd. at the corner of Main Street and Fairview Avenue.

The business and homeowners are on edge.


"They want to know dates, when is everything happening and how is the value of the property doing," Mr. Pattenden said.
