

Spoil a mosquito's dinner plans
Protect yourself ... Cover up ... Wear repellent

NOTICE OF PESTICIDE USE

York Region West Nile virus Mosquito Control Program:

Please note that from May 20, 2008 to September 30, 2008, the Regional Municipality of York in conjunction with York Region District School Board and York Catholic District School Board will be conducting a larvicide program under the authority of the Medical Officer of Health to control larval mosquitoes in order to prevent their development into vectors of West Nile virus.

The pellet formulation of the larvicide methoprene (product name Altosid), with Registration No.21809 or the Altosid XR briquets (methoprene) with Registration No. 27694 under the *Pest Control Products Act* or Bacillus sphaericus (product name VectoLex WSP) with Registration No. 28009 under the *Pest Control Products Act* will be placed into catch basins along Regional and Municipal Roads and in catch basins, as required, on private property respectively.

In addition, the biological larvicide Bacillus thuringiensis subspecies israelensis (product name Aquabac XT), with Registration No. 26860 or Aquabac 200G with Registration No. 26863 under the *Pest Control Products Act* or VectoLex CG Registration No. 28008 under the *Pest Control Products Act* may be placed in ditches and temporary or permanent pools including storm water retention ponds if evidence of mosquito breeding is found.

All larvicide will be applied by Ministry of the Environment licensed applicators or trained technicians.

Larviciding is a low risk and effective measure when used in accordance with label directions for the control of West Nile virus. The slow-release pellet formulation interferes with the mosquito life cycle, preventing the mosquito larva from reaching maturity. It is not sprayed. The products have been approved by both the provincial and federal governments and are considered low risk for humans, pets and the environment.

and expanded, Mr. Halse said the name was changed from Springvale Baptist Church to just Springvale Church to encourage more people to attend the facility.

"Our services are more contemporary," he said. "With the new and old entities coming in, we're really trying to build a whole campus that will be community focused."

A large gym is also under construction, currently serving as a temporary sanctuary, housing about 700 people.

The new sanctuary, expected to be complete in the coming months, will hold about 1,100 people, Mr. Halse said.

Mr. Flemming credits those sitting in the pews for donating and sacrificing to make the addition possible.

"Everything basically came from within the congregation," he said. "These people's commitment. It's been amazing." The church has also held auctions and dinner for nine years.

Sports leagues are in the planning stages. Mr. Flemming is optimistic all renovations, including playing fields on the back 15 acres, will be completed within six to 10 years.

He encourages residents of all faiths, ages and backgrounds to check out the new facilities.

"We're having kind of a ministry fair (in the lobby), where people can wander around and find out about all the different programs they can get into," he said.

Tours and refreshments will start at 5 p.m., the new church, located on 3885 Stouffville Rd., next Saturday, with Phil Callaway, a comedian, speaking shortly after.

Sunday, Charles Price, senior pastor at the People's Church in Toronto, will perform the dedication service at 2 p.m.
