There has been little difficulty in identifying the top senior and junior athletes at Stouffville District Secondary School.

Before this year, that is, Jamie Hewitt recalled.

But when the committee of coaches had to choose this year's honourees, the Spartans' physical education department head conceded they had difficulty. That's because there was a healthy cast of nominees.

When the final tabulations were compiled, the four winners were unveiled at last Thursday's annual athletic banquet at the school.

Matt Raguseo was named the senior boys' athlete of the year while Jaime Sparks and Natalie Geiger shared the senior girls' honours.

In the junior category, Jeremy Brownridge was the boys winner while the girls honour went to Dayle Wilkinson.

"There were definitely some tough decisions to make," Hewitt said. "We had a lot of candidates."

Nominated were 13 boys and 11 girls in the senior class. In junior, it was 11 girls and nine boys.

Presenting the toughest challenge in making their final selections though, was the senior class, Hewitt said.

This past year, the Grade 12 student was a member of the school's Ontario Federation of School Athletic Associations AA gold-medal winning hockey and rugby teams. He also played volleyball.

While honoured to earn the award, he said being a part of the two hockey and rugby OFSAA goldmedal winning teams was far more significant to him.

"Those awards mean a lot more," he said of the team titles.

Also a Grade 12 student, Sparks was voted the school's junior girls athlete of the year when she was in Grade 10.

During the year, Sparks was a member of the school's basketball. volleyball, hockey, soccer and badminton teams.

Geiger, a Grade 12 student and former junior girls athlete of the year when she was in Grade 9, participated with the school's track and field, basketball, volleyball and badminton teams.

She has accepted a track and field scholarship at Notre Dame University earlier this year and

scheduled to enrol at the storied Indiana campus this fall. Geiger set a school mark by winning the OFSAA 400 metres race in each of her four years at Stouffville.

Sparks and Geiger are 90-percent students in the classroom.

Of this year's junior recipients, both of whom are in Grade 10, Brownridge was a member of the boys' rugby, volleyball and basketball teams.

Wilkinson played with the girls' hockey, soccer, basketball and volleyball teams.

Student-athletes were nominated for the awards by the school coaches in late May. The final selections were made in early June.
