Stouffville's Jason Parsons spins turntables to Edgefest, top of Toronto radio charts

Radio play, bigger gigs sound good to USS

Patience and persistence are paying off with big-time gigs and radio play for a Stouffville man and his Markham partner in music.

Stouffville's Jason "Human Kebab" Parsons, 29, and Ash Buchholz, 30, are taking the music world by storm.

The duo are members of Ubiquitous Synergy Seeker, a band that's quickly gaining recognition, and top ratings, at radio stations around the country.

"The analogy I like to use is that we've been paving the runway for a while, and the asphalt is finally ready. All of our diligence and persistence has delivered," said Mr. Buchholz, vocalist and guitarist.

"Gone are the days where somebody gets up one day and plays a show and they're a superstar," said Mr. Parsons, who works the turntables.

"You have to stick to the grind and work and network and get to know people."

The pair met in 2004 and have created music ever since.

Other acts on the bill include Linkin Park, Stone Temple Pilots and the Sam Roberts Band.

They play the World Electronic Music Festival in Madawaska, Ont., July 18, 19 and 20.

GO Transit users can use a new station starting this fall.

The new Lincolnville Station, at Bethesda Road and Tenth Line, is now slated to open in September.

It was to open last month.

"This is a growing area, and (new station) will take the pressure off the existing Stouffville station," said Ed Shea, manager of marketing and communications for GO.

The new station will feature parking for 150 cars, with room for expansion, kiss 'n ride lanes for passenger pick-up and drop off and be fully accessible for wheelchairs.

The station will also have ticket vending machines as opposed to an attendant in a booth.

While construction on the station is "virtually finished", according to Mr. Shea, GO is working with CN to finalize the logistics of the route.

Before becoming the new station, GO used the existing property as a layover-yard.

an on-air meteorologist.

But, today the 680 News weather man is in northern Whitchurch-Stouffville at work with his charity.

The native of Trinidad and Tobago founded Recycle Your Bicycle, a nonprofit volunteer organization that collects and ships unwanted bikes and bike parts to Cuba, in 2003.

During his first visit to the country the year before, he was astonished to see residents riding 50-year-old bikes.

Foundation and Recycle Your Bicycle are packing a shipping container of medical equipment and other supplies to send to Cuba at home near Ballantrae today.

The equipment includes hospital beds, mattresses, wheelchairs, centrifuges, cardiac carts, crutches and canes, while the supplies include computers and bike, clothing and possibly some bicycles, if room allows.

"Once again, Canadians are proving that they have very large hearts and are more than willing to help the less fortunate in other countries," Mr. Hosein said.

The Orion Foundation, a nonprofit organization, has helped save thousands of lives by sending HIV meds to sub-Saharan Africa in recent years.

It also works along side the Recycle Your Bicycle program,

which has sent more than 1,500 bicycles to the Cuban people, as well as medical equipment, clothing, shoes, computers, sewing machines and more to help the underprivileged and sick.

"All of these good works have been accomplished with the contributions of concerned and committed citizens," Orion Foundation CFO James Arion said. "The Orion Foundation and Recycle Your Bicycle are simply outlets for their generosity."
