Splashpads hit with parents, kids

ooking for the coolest place in town? During July and August, hundreds of children are doing just that. And they're finding it, three places in fact, some only a few blocks from where they live.

They're called splashpads, a type of playground paradise engineered by Vortex Aquatic Structures International Inc. of Montreal and sold through A.B.C. Recreation Ltd. of Paris, ON.

More than 2,000 have been installed across Canada and the United States, as well as Europe and the Far East, since the company was founded in 1995.

Stouffville sites include Millard Street, west of Winlane Drive and Hoover Park Drive at Mostar Street and Byers Pond Way.

A fourth is planned next month in the area of Tenth Line South and Durham Road 30.

According to Rob Raycroft, manager of facilities and parks, others will be added as residential development warrants.

The splashpad is a system of sprinklers, activated when a child touches what is called a bollard, a small black ball atop a pole. This action generates a computerized flow of water that continues for nine minutes unless re-activated.

According to Mr. Raycroft, splashpads are in use in other areas of York Region including Markham, Richmond Hill, Aurora and Newmarket.

But on a per capita basis, Stouffville has more than most.

The leisure services staff, working in close co-operation with the department of planning, viewed a similar facility in Ajax before giving Stouffville's projects their stamp of approval.

"We combined the best features of everything we saw," Mr. Raycroft said.-

Splashpads are only in neighbourhood parks, Mr. Raycroft explained.

Added features include basketball courts, picnic tables, monkey bars, swings and slides.

Weather permitting, the courts will be flooded in winter for hockey.

There's no age restriction with regard to Splashpad use, Mr. Raycroft said but the overall play area is set up mainly to accommodate junior and senior aged children.

"We've incorporated a little bit of everything," he said.

The cost per splashpad is about \$100,000, with all funds coming from development charges.

Because the surface is rubberized, the facility requires little maintenance and is perfectly safe.

to kids," Mr. Raycroft said. "It's very rewarding to see so many using them, much like watching children run through sprinklers in their own back yards. Parents also love them. We're very pleased with the result."

Because the outdoor pool is still in use, no decision has yet been made with regard to a splashpad in Memorial

"It's whatever the public wants," Mr. Raycroft said.

The parents I spoke with are pleased.

"Fantastic," said Peter Mitchell, grandfather of three. "They're safe and child friendly."

"A healthy activity for kids," agreed Lida Kalbassi, mother of two.

"It's a great idea and very convenient," said Franca Ioannou, also a mother of two. "My children love it."

Glenda Reynolds, a grandmother, called them "ideal". "The water may be cold but children don't seem to mind. It's fun for them. They soon get used to them."

She, like Mr. Mitchell, appreciates the safety aspect of the facility.

"They're wonderful," said Kelly Krabi, mother of two, "and very clean."

Jennifer Lehman glanced back in time when she was a child.

"We never had this sort of thing when I was a kid," she said. "I might just sneak in and cool off, too."

With regard to water temperatures, she said children can run in, then warm up and run back in again.

"My children love it," said Kate Rego, "and we don't have to pay for all this fun." She described the Byers Pond site as "a beautiful park".


