Goalie has eye on national team slot

That day, the women's national under-22 hockey team announced the 40 candidates it would invite to its final weeklong selection camp, which starts tomorrow at York University.

The 20-year-old Stouffville resident knew if she received a call from Hockey Canada, she'd be off the list.

While Knox answered more than a few telephone calls that day, fortunately none were from Hockey Canada.

"At the same time, I have scheduled appointments with my sport psychologist, Dr. Jill Tracey, at Wilfrid Laurier right before I go to the camp, so I'm in the right mindset."
