Karen has kids flying high

It's just a non-descript brown building on the outside.

When you enter, the first thing you hear is the bounce of young athletes reaching great heights on several trampolines lined up inside a 3,000-square-foot gym.

Some of the trampolinists are horizontal, some vertical and others perform somersaults as they emulate their heroes who are competing in Beijing.

The athletes working out Tuesday morning have new dreams after watching Karen Cockburn and Jason Burnett win silver in trampoline at the 2008 Summer Olympics.

Both are members of the Skyriders Trampoline Place on Leslie Street in Thornhill.

The place was still buzzing with excitement after the medal wins.

But this trampoline club isn't just your average club.

In addition to Ms Cockburn and Mr. Burnett, the club has produced Matt Turgeon, a bronze medalist at the 2000 Games in Sydney and Rosannagh MacLennan, who competed in her first Olympics this year.

For Bethany Gee, a trampolinist for seven years, seeing Ms Cockburn win a medal was an inspiration.

"It was amazing. Her routine was

amazing. She deserved it," Ms Gee said. "I get to see her train everyday so I know what it takes to get to that level."

Ms Gee, who hopes to compete at the Olympics herself, spends eight hours a week on the trampoline and hits the gym twice a week.

Longtime club coach Alan Zuckerman describes the wins by both Mr. Burnett and Ms Cockburn as "too emotional to work".

"I have to be at home alone to watch it. My neighbours know to shut the windows when it's on.

"We didn't know what to expect because you can have a good day or a bad day.

"They train so hard and they have 20 seconds

to do it."

Ms Cockburn's nickname at the club is The Silent Warrior and Mr. Zuckerman says it suits her.

Colin Heppell, 14, of Newmarket, also appreciated the medal wins.

"I thought it was pretty cool," he said, adding maybe one day he could do the same.

Alex Fragiadakis was also wowed.

"It's really cool because you know them," said Ms Fragiadakis, 17.

The club has operated since 1990 and has about 320 members.

Program co-ordinator Helen Saari was still on a high the morning after Ms Cockburn's performance.

"I could have fainted five times watching," Ms Saari said, laughing.

But the medals represent much more than just a thrill, Ms Saari said.

"One of the moms at the club was telling me after Karen got the silver, her son turned to her and said, 'Mom, I know what I want to do now. I want to go the Olympics and win a silver in trampoline," Ms Saari said.

It's not like the club is lacking in popularity as it has waiting lists for both competitive and recreational programs. But Mr. Zuckerman anticipates even more interest, thanks to the high profile the sport has received during the Olympics.
