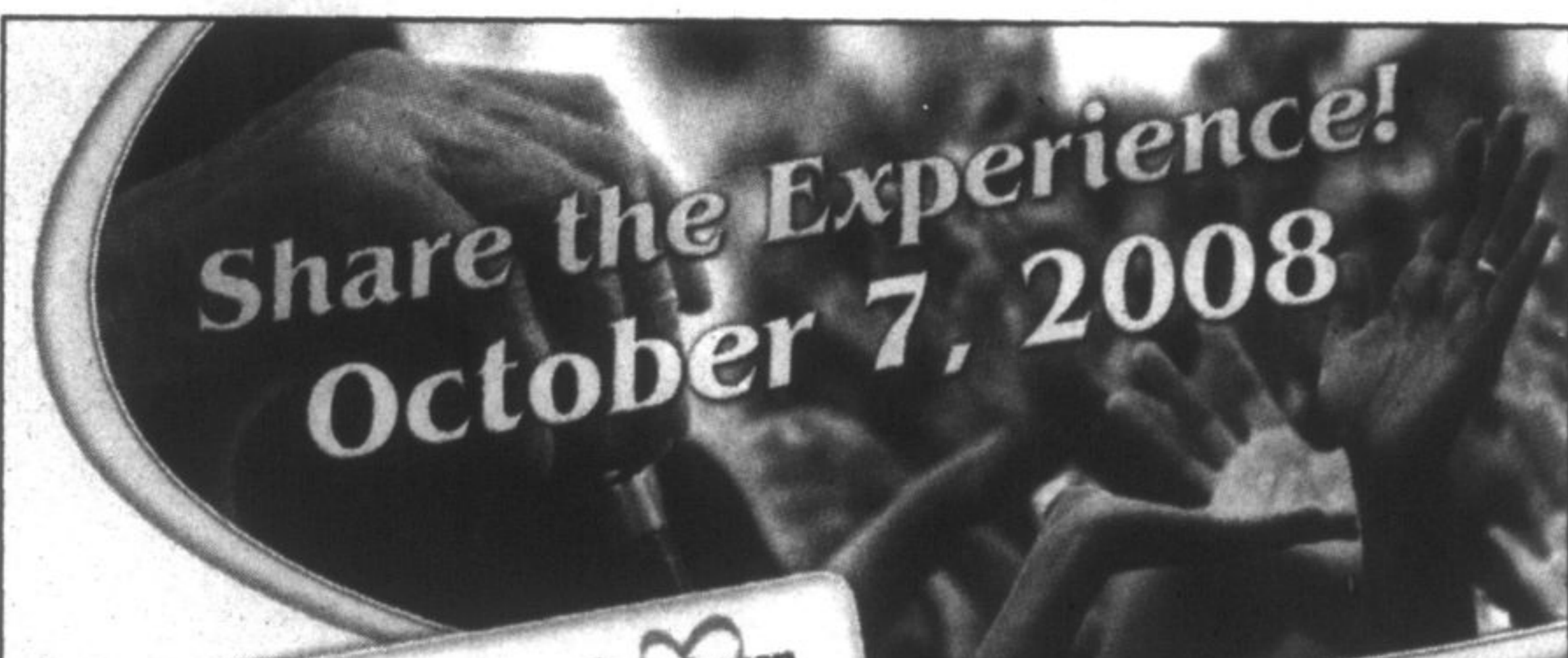

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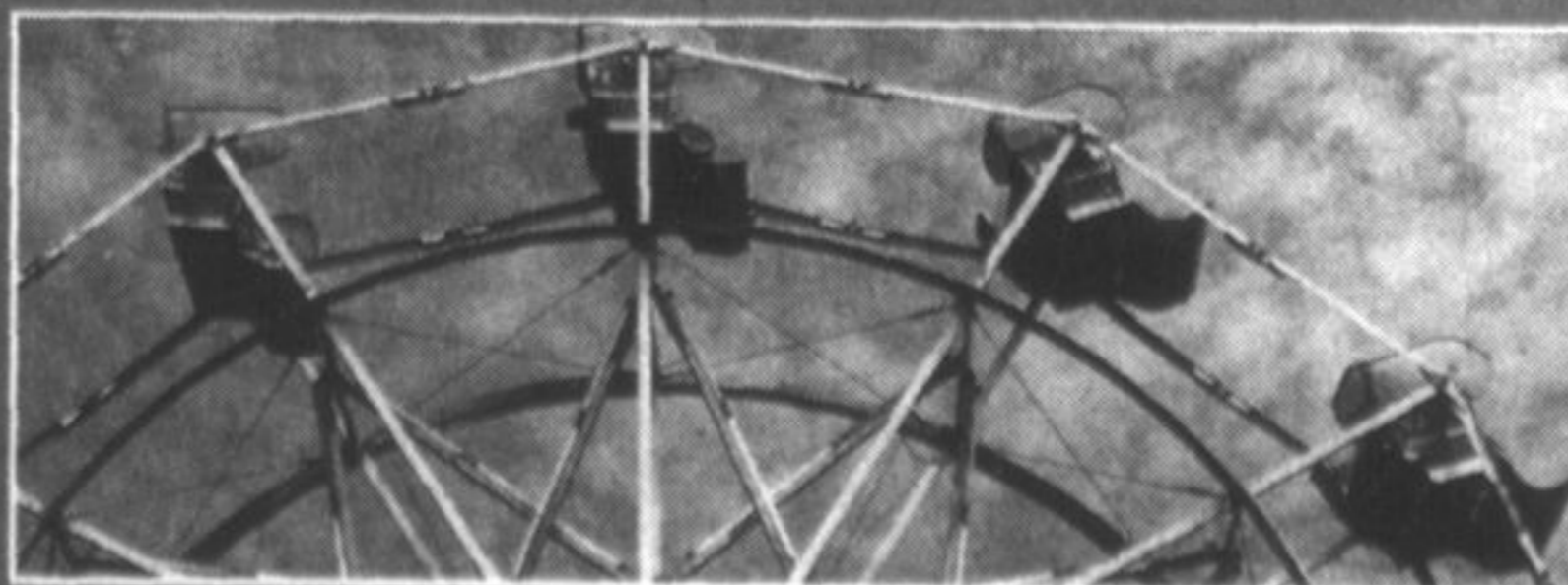

## Firefighters hitting home

Fires can start easily at home, sadly. They're the focus of Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 5 to 11, in Whitchurch-Stouffville, "It's Fire Prevention Week - Prevent Home Fires" is the slogan.

"A pot holder too close to a lit burner or clothing too close to a space heater could be all it takes to start a home fire," said Jeff Bignell, a fire prevention/public education officer with Whitchurch-Stouffville Fire and Emergency Services.

The leading causes of home fires in Ontario include cooking, heating equipment, electrical equipment, cigarettes, candles, matches and lighters.

"Additionally, we must not forget to educate residents on why working smoke alarms and a home escape plan are essential toward ensuring everyone gets out safely in a case of fire," Mr. Bignell said.

Firefighters will spread the word on safety next week at:

- An open house Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., at downtown Stouffville fire hall, 6392 Main St. A barbecue, prize giveaways, games and a visit by Sparky the fire dog are on the agenda.
- Boston Pizza Monday from 6 to 9 p.m. during Fire Prevention serve night.
- The Stouffville Spirit Jr. A hockey game next Thursday at 7:30 p.m. at the Stouffville Arena.
