## Stouffville kids clash on ice in high school playoffs, again

Underdog SDSS, Brother Andre meet for third straight season

Is it true good things come in three's?

The Stouffville District Secondary School Spartans senior boys' hockey team hopes there's validity to that adage when they open a York Region Athletic Association tier one semifinal series Wednesday.

The Spartans' opponent in the best-ofthree is the team they defeated in the York final the last two seasons, the arch-rival **Brother Andre Cardinals.** 

Only this time around, the Markham school appears to be the far superior team on paper having finished first in the East Division with a 6-1-1 mark. Playing in the same division, the Spartans finished fourth with a 2-4-2 mark.

The Cardinals won both head-to-head encounters.

The two teams also met at the Sir Oliver Mowat Tournament in Scarborough with the Cardinals prevailing in a shootout.

"It's definitely a good rivalry," Spartans head coach Jamie Hewitt said of the meetings the two clubs have had over the last few years.

There are also neighbourhood bragging rights at stake. Brother Andre's roster always includes Stouffville residents, many of whom play on rep teams with some of the Spartans.

Hewitt acknowledged his team will face an uphill battle this time around.

"I've always said that Brother Andre would be the team to beat. They won our division this year," he said.

off the upset against the second-seeded Cardinals, Hewitt said a couple of things must fall into place.

For starters, he said they must receive some timely goaltending from Chris Pennanen.

"He's good," Hewitt said of his Grade 12 netminder. "He'll have to give us a steady game and he has that potential. He's had a great year for us."

Since the Christmas holiday break, Hewitt says his players have begun to grasp a new system.

"If we play our system and be smart in our own end I feel we have a chance," Hewitt said.

Despite sporting a sub .500 record, Hewitt was quick to note playing in the highly competitive East Division, which also includes another semifinalist in St. Theresa of Lisieux (Richmond Hill) and Markham, who were eliminated in a quarter-final series, has brought out the best in his club.

"To play Brother Andre, Markham District High School and St. Theresa of Lisieux, every game is tough. You've got to battle and be ready and prepared to face them," he said.

The Spartans will host the second game Feb. 24 at the Stouffville Arena at 1 p.m.

If a third game is required, Brother Andre would host it at a date and time yet to be determined.

The winner of this series will face the victor of the other semifinal series pitting St. Theresa of Lisieux and Sacred Heart Catholic High School (Newmarket).
