Celebration of the Arts began in 2001 and is the brainchild of Ian Proudfoot, publisher of York Region Media Group, who wanted to showcase young regional talent.


Since 2001, almost 150 bursaries have been awarded, valued at more than \$250,000.

Live audition opportunities will take place at the Newmarket Theatre on May 14 and June 2.


