Snazzy new home for skaters, hockey players

It will be pretty cool, but not cold.

Amongst a hockey bag full of upgrades, the Stouffville Clippers Sports Complex has taken the chill out of the air found in many older rinks, including the often frigid Stouffville Arena.

The new twin-rink centre, on Weldon Road between Nofrills and

Stouffville Secondary, will open Feb. 2, just in time for the minor hockey playoffs.

It's big and spacious with plenty of vantage points, as a tour last Thursday pointed out.

It's not ready for prime time yet.

Hard hats, not hockey helmets, are still the required protective head gear. Workers were installing seats (another upgrade from the old place's bleachers) and tile. The score clocks aren't up. We're weeks away from ice time.

Things that hit a first-time visitor like an errant slapshot:

• If you've been in the arenas of Angus Glen Community Centre and Library in Markham, this will look familiar. The seating arrangement is eerily similar. Town staff didn't re-invent the wheel here. They borrowed ideas from other rinks, too, including the Holly Community Centre in Barrie.

• You won't see a heater in the joint, but town officials promise it will be a comfortable 70 F in the
