options looked at by the town for that intersection, which included maintaining the status quo and installing new traffic lights.

Both options were set aside in favour of a more 'innovative' solution — the roundabout.

"As an alternative to traffic signals, roundabouts provide a safe and efficient form of traffic control for motorists and pedestrians alike," according to Tom Parry, director of engineering and capital works for the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville. "Roundabouts offer fewer opportunities for conflicts in an intersection."

At a four-way intersection, according to Mr. Parry, there are 32 potential vehicleto-vehicle conflict points and 16 possible vehicle-to-pedestrian conflicts.

However, in a roundabout, vehicle-tovehicle and vehicle-to-pedestrian conflicts drop to eight each.

"While traffic does need to slow down to navigate a roundabout, motorists often do not need to stop, thereby reducing delays and improving traffic throughput, while reducing overall greenhouse gas emissions from idling vehicles," Mr. Parry wrote in his recommendation to council. which was endorsed on Jan. 19.

Installing the roundabout will save the town about \$200,000 versus erecting traffic signals at Hoover Park Drive and Mantle Avenue, according to Mr. Parry.

HOW TO CORRECTLY ROUND A ROUNDABOUT

The Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville has produced a brochure to help you navigate its growing pool of roundabouts.

Here are some highlights:

- · All traffic moves in a counter-clockwise direction starting at the right of the inner circle.
- · Vehicles already in the roundabout have the right of way, therefore, all entering vehicles must yield to them.
- When entering the roundabout, you have three options: turn right, turn left or go straight.
- · To turn right, enter the circle's outside lane and exit at the first opening.
- · To turn left, enter the roundabout via the lane closest to the inner circle and continue around until your exit.
- · If going straight through, enter the roundabout and exit at the desired point.

DON'T PASS, DON'T STOP

- · When entering the roundabout, wait for a break in traffic as vehicles already in the roundabout have the right of way and do not enter next to another vehicle already within the roundabout.
- · Other important pieces of information that will help you manoeuvre the roundabouts:
- do not pass other vehicles within the roundabout
- do not stop while in the roundabout you have the right of way
- when approaching your exit, use your right turn signal
- all of the same rules that apply to vehicles, also apply to cyclists
- · When it comes to pedestrians, they are not to walk to the inner circle, but use the crosswalks and sidewalks on the outside of the roundabouts.
- · Traffic has the right of way over pedestrians, so walkers must wait for a break in traffic before crossing.
