Another new program being offered this spring is Monkeynastix, which combines creativity with music and story telling, flexibility, balance, strength, agility and body aware-

"It's a different perspective on gymnastics," Ms McEachen said.

Monkeynastix was created in 1995 by Dirk Cilliers, a former South African Olympic-level gymnast in Johannesburg, South Africa as a gymnastics and movement education program for children aged one to six.

The program was introduced to Canadians last year by Jennifer and Hendry Van der Wath who came across the program many years ago while they were living in South Africa.

"We want kids to move," said Vanessa MacDonald, the head instructor and local franchise Monkeynastix franchise owner. Ms MacDonald co-owns the company with her sister Christina Batty. "We want kids to get away from the computer."

Monkeynastix is a structure program with a curriculum. While the program is designed to encourage children to do their best, it is not competitive.

"It gives them self-confidence at their fitness level ... they're always successful," Ms MacDonald said. "We'll be challenging the seven and eight year olds a little differently than the three and four year olds."

There are various age group programs, which build upon each other, for kids aged one to eight.

"Hopefully, when they're done at eight years old, they'll go into a specific sport," Ms MacDonald said.
