MMA rookie fast learner

Scott Oughton was looking to get in a fight.

Just recently, the 18-year-old Stouffville resident found one online in Cedar Springs, Mich.

There was no law-breaking involved.

Rather, it enabled him to utilize his fighting skills in a mixed martial arts match.


A student at the Stouffville Martial Arts Academy, Oughton made his debut in the octagon in an event conducted by the League American Elite Cagefighting circuit.

Oughton was declared the winner in the third round after dominating the fight.

Making Oughton's feat even more remarkable is that his opponent, Alonzo Turner, was some 10 years older and an ex-Marine wrestler.

"Getting my hands raised at the end of the fight and listening to the crowd was a great feeling," Oughton said. "Now, I just can't wait to get back in the cage again."

Oughton's infatuation with mixed martial arts stemmed from a combination of events

that included taking up muay that three years ago and watching UFC matches on TV.

Added to that mix, Oughton is an avid follower of boxing and paid close attention to the exploits of light welterweight fighter Ricky Hatton.

"I got hooked instantly,"
Oughton said. "I also liked the
competition of martial arts and
felt competing would be the
best way to challenge myself and
become a great fighter."

Oughton credits the Stouffville Martial Arts Academy where he has a white belt in Gracie Ju Jitsu and trains under the tutelage of Craig Hroncok.

Likewise, Hroncok isimpressed with Oughton.

"It really depends on how far (Oughton) wants to go, how much and how hard he wants to train. Natural talent will get you only so far, the rest is a combination of hard work, motivation, coaching and ability to learn," Hroncok said. "I think he can get to the top amateur level. Pro mixed martial arts is another animal altogether. Everything has to be stepped up several notches."

Oughton acknowledged he still has plenty to learn if he hopes to continue his ascent up the competitive ladder.

"I'm continuing to work on all aspects of my game to become a better fighter," he said. "I plan on competing in mixed martial arts again and I'm planning on having some muay thai and jiu jitsu matches as well."

Oughton also hopes to make a trip to Thailand later this year to train.
