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## Early birdies getting jump on season

In fact, during the seven years Roy Chan has been the head professional at the Maples of Ballantrae Golf Club, he couldn't recall the tulips coming into bloom and grass turning green as early as this year.

Especially since it has enabled public golf courses in Whitchurch Stouffville to open their front gates a little earlier than normal.

While this year's opening at Maples of Ballantae was a little ahead of the norm, he was quick to note it's not the earliest on the club's record.



uring the 1950s and '60s, minstrel shows, in which white actors, dancers and singers wore stylized blackface makeup and performed stereotyped imitations of African Americans, were

In 1959, a group of people from the Stouffville United Church Couples Club was itching for a creative outlet and decided to stage a minstrel show, with the first production hitting the stage on April 29, 1960. It was called Minstrel Mania 60.

Segments of humour and dancing separated the solo and group musical numbers.

Minstrel 61 and 62 were also staged for large audiences, before the curtain closed on them.

Minstrel shows were no longer acceptable forms of performance, however, the local thespians knew there was something special about a show that utilized humour, music and dance in a unique way.

After a year away from the stage, the people who helmed the local minstrel shows came back with a new production concept, one the whole family could enjoy, and called it Music Mania.

The group is celebrating its 50th show later this month with a retrospective entitled Solid Gold.

"It's a big thing for this community and it's a big achievement for its participants because it's
