Druggist, MPP could square off at forum

Will prescriptions cost more? Will you be charged for what is currently being offered for free? Will the local independent pharmacy go out of business?

These are just some of the questions Farid Wassef, a community pharmacist for Stouffville IDA Pharmacy, will be answering Thursday evening during an information session hosted by the Whitchurch-Stouffville Public Library.

York Region MPPs Helena Jaczek and Frank Klees have also been invited by the library. Mr. Klees declined, citing a previous commitment.

"The issue at hand is that the public is outright confused," Mr. Wassef said.

Last month, the provincial gov-

ernment announced that professional allowances paid by drug manufacturers to pharmacists will be discontinued.

"It's not a kick-back. It's a professional allowance," Mr. Wassef said. "You can't go golfing on it. It has to go back into the store for professional services."

Those services, which are currently free to the customer, include blister packaging, delivery, renewal

of prescription with doctors, dis-posal of expired medications and used needles as well as diabetic and asthma training and education.

"Pharmacists are part of the public health care system," Mr. Wassef said. "The government knows they can't have everyone rush to the doctor or hospital for a sniffle."

The forum starts at 7 p.m. The library is located at 30 Burkholder St. in Memorial Park.
