More than 1,200 'distracted drivers' nabbed by cops

During the past three months, York police have heard a lot of excuses after drivers are pulled over for so-called distracted driving.

One driver spun a tale of not actually talking on the phone but instead, using it to scratch an ear itch. Another driver tried to talk their way out of a ticket by claiming they were just holding their cellphone.

Police began issuing \$155 tickets Feb. 1. Since then there have been Sgt. Ed Villamere said.

The charges have been laid for two infractions; using a handheld device while driving, such as a cellphone and driving while using a handheld entertainment device, such as a DVD or laptop.

Motorist can buy a hands-free device for less than the cost of the fine, Sgt. Villamere said.

The distracted driving law makes it illegal for drivers to talk, text, type, dial or e-mail using handheld cellphones and other handheld communications and entertainment devices.

Drivers can use the devices 447 warnings and 794 charges laid, hands-free. The legislation also bans the viewing of display screens,

such as on-board DVD players.

You can't use your cellphone or GPS while stopped at a red light or while sitting in traffic. Rather, pull into a parking lot, Sgt. Villamere said.

Even if you're using a paper map, police can still lay charges if you are

driving erratically, such as failing to drive in a marked lane or careless driving.

Distracted driver blitzes have been included as part of regular enforcement, York police said.

Even so, he regularly sees three and five motorists using handheld devices during his short drive to pick up his children from school.

"Ten tickets isn't going to stop some people," he said.

Drivers' compliance with the new legislation is not as high as it could be, Ontario Safety League president Brian Patterson said.

He sees several drivers a week using cellphones while driving, he added.

Earlier this week, Toronto police enacted a zero-tolerance policy for the offence.

Sgt. Villamere noted the laying of charges remains at an officer's discretion and some people require different levels of education than others.

However, he rejected the idea police are going easy on drivers if some distracted driver aren't charged when pulled over.

Police are enforcing the distracted driving law as much as they are seatbelt legislation, for example, Sgt. Villamere said.


