New protocols would become more directorial and would include stricter sanitization, screening and cleaning procedures. The OSPCA is also looking at mandatory attire, including gowns and foot coverings.

The organization is also looking at the role of volunteers and procedures for allowing them into the animal care areas, Ms MacDonald said, noting the OSPCA wants to work with public health to create emergency protocols similar to ones used in hospitals during the SARS and H1N1 outbreaks, Ms MacDonald said.

A report detailing a list of protocols and procedures will be made public once OSPCA vets and staff know more about this vicious and highly contiguous strain of ringworm, OSPCA board of directors chairperson Rob Godfrey said.

"This is a different strain of ringworm," he said. "It's not your run-of-the-mill vanilla ringworm. There has been nothing of this magnitude in the province before. Every vet we've met with has never seen anything like it."

This is the third outbreak

of ringworm the Woodbine Avenue facility has had since the shelter closed temporarily in February. The first round was a typical case, but each round became more severe, Ms MacDonald said. The shelter was to re-open after a May 6 contamination test came back negative. But a May 10 test indicated there was still contamination.

The board is in the process of selecting an independent consultant to launch an investigation of protocols and suggest changes.

Since ringworm can be an airborne fungus, the OSPCA is testing all aspects of the facility, including ventilation system, tiles, cleaning supplies and drywall.

"It will take as long as it takes," Ms MacDonald said.
"Heaven forbid we rush through this and end up right back here."

The initial call to euthanize about 350 animals led to days of protest and death threats against OSPCA staff and volunteers.

The 99 animals euthanized were severely infected with ringworm and were the first to be infected during the first outbreak in late February. The animals were humanely euthanized – first

sedated then euthanized, Ms MacDonald said.

The 210 animals that were not euthanized were to all have been isolated in private veterinary clinics to undergo treatment and testing by Friday night.

An additional 86 cats and 18 dogs showing light symptoms are still in the shelter undergoing testing, which could take up to a month to complete.

But the animals still pose a public health risk, Ms Mac-Donald said. "It's a wild-card," she said. "What we don't want is an outbreak in a day care or nursing home or another shelter."

Protesters at the shelter offered to take animals for treatment, but that wasn't an option, Ms MacDonald said. "Those animals being tested are a public health issue," she said. "That's a very compassionate offer, but it would be irresponsible of us to do that. No one regrets this more than we do."

Six staff members and two volunteers were infected with ringworm and one staffer may have infected family members.
