Jeweller, radio station receiving new awards from chamber

David Barthau is the Whitchurch-Stouffville Chamber of Commerce's first-ever lifetime achievement award winner.

The announcement was made Monday during the chamber's Business Recognition Awards nominee presentation.

"We, as a chamber of commerce and the organizing committee, wanted to recognize a business person in the community for their length of service and their community involvement," said Karen Cashin, chairperson of the chamber's business awards selection committee.

The awards banquet and ceremony, complete with Academy Awards theme, will take place Sept.

23 at Stouffville Creek Retirement residence.

"We wanted somebody with a well-known local profile, who was also recognized for supporting local events and activities."

"I'm quite honoured to be recognized," Mr. Barthau, owner of Barthau Jewellers said in an interview with The Sun-Tribune. "I had no idea. I don't submit my name for any awards. I guess I figure if someone is going to be awarded it

should be on merit or peer recognition."

Mr. Barthau opened his jewelry store in 1978 and two years later he and his family moved from Markham to Stouffville.

"I thought, 'It's a great town.
We've got to move up there.' And
I didn't like the commute from
Markham to Stouffville," he said.

Mr. Barthau has been a chamber of commerce member since the early 1980s and spearheaded the creation of the Stouffville Business Improvement area, which is now the Downtown Stouffville Working Group.


He has also been involved with the Stouffville Lions Club and in 2000 he started the organization's vision screening program for children.

"It's benefited so many kids because we've identified vision problems," Mr. Barthau said.

Works centre delayed again

Occupancy of the town's new operations centre has once again been delayed by a month.

The move-in date is now slated for Oct. 22. In May, the anticipated occupancy date was Aug. 31 and before that it was expected to be in June or July.

"Aquicon (the contractor) actually slipped in the month of July due mostly to its trades not keeping up with the schedule," wrote Paul Whitehouse, director of public works for the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville in his report to council Tuesday.

Despite the delays, the project is expected to come in on budget - \$10.76 million.

The centre, at Hwy. 48 and Bethesda Road, will consist of a 28,987-square-foot main, operations building, a 4,465-square-foot unheated storage facility and a 10,147-square-foot salt/sand storage building.
