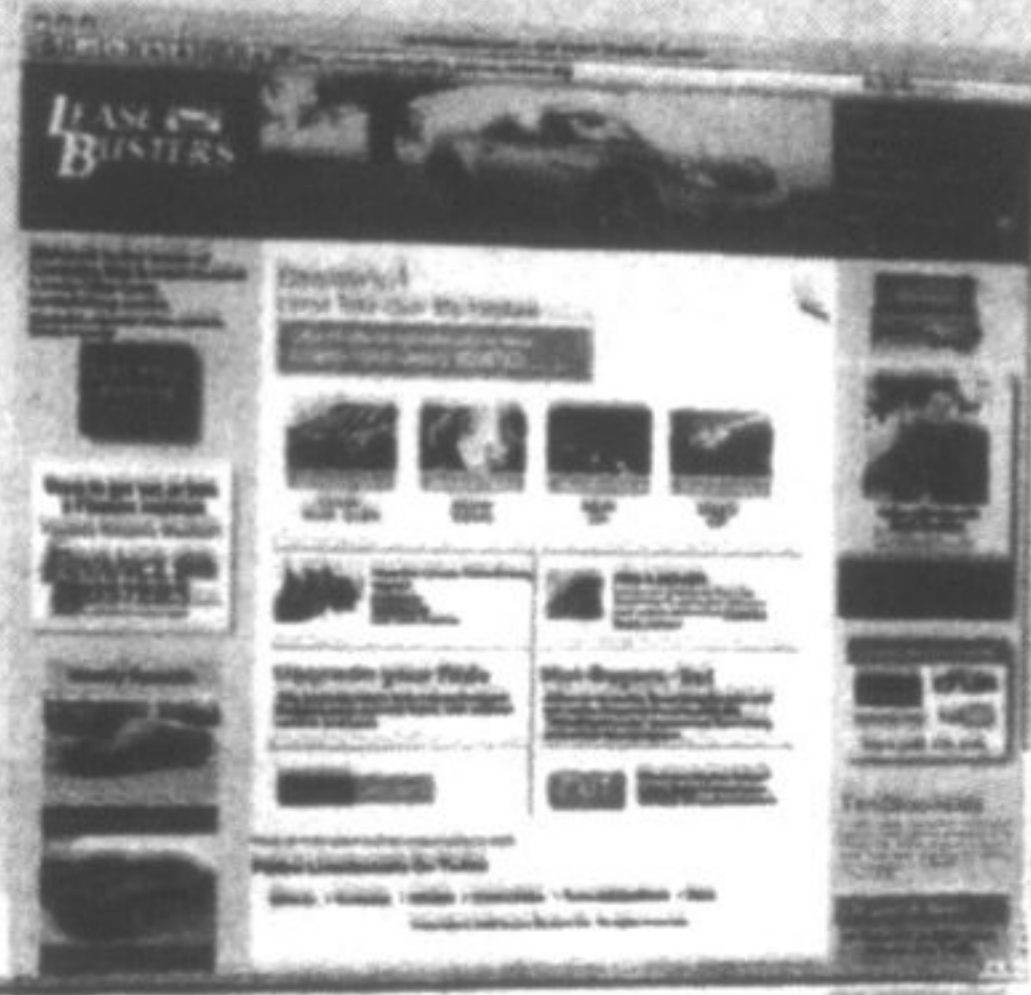


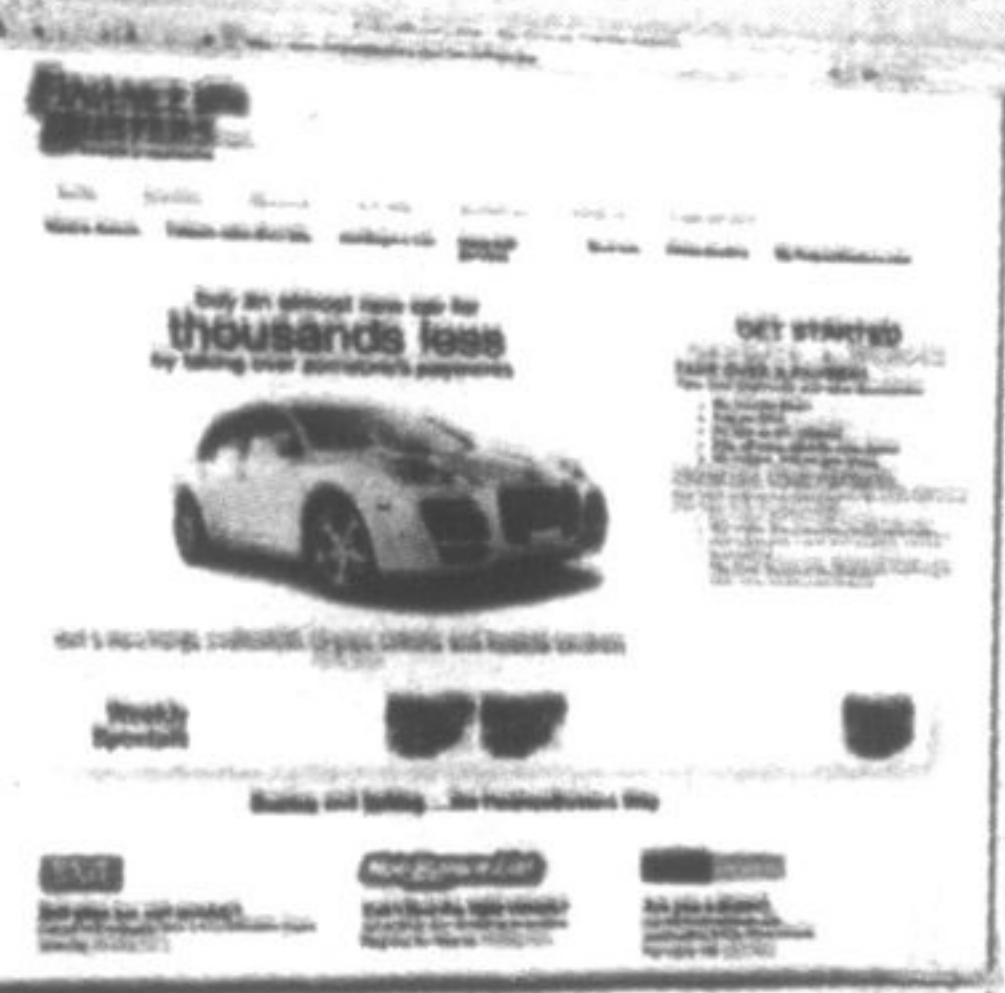
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Victim's mom wants 'town taken back'

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dropped down to his hips.

"He was manipulating himself ...," Shelley said.

Elizabeth and Jack, who saw nothing, and the puppy, quickly headed home, which was about 1,500 feet away and told her mother what just happened. They called the police.

This was not the first encounter Elizabeth had with the man. She first saw him earlier during the walk as he sat in his car in front of an elementary school. He was easy to spot, according to Shelley, because he was wearing a fluorescent orange T-shirt and baseball hat.

When a construction vehicle drove by, according to Shelley, who recounted her daughter's description to The Sub-Tribune, the man drove away.

"(He) wanted to be blended in with the other construction people or (he was) one of the construction people and (he didn't) want them saying 'what are you doing?'" Shelley said.

Elizabeth spotted the man again down another street. It was as the trio headed back towards home and they turned a corner they saw him for a third time.

He had driven around the neighbourhood and pulled up to the curb, facing the wrong direction. As the kids walked along the grass, which went beside the driver's side of the vehicle, he exposed himself.

Upon hearing what happened, Shelley called her oldest son Mitch, who was at the skate park in Memorial Park with his friends and asked that he come home.

Like all 10-year-old boys, he balked at the idea of having to head home early. So Shelley let him stay but not before describing the man Elizabeth just encountered.

Within 10 minutes, Mitch called his mother back to tell her a man fitting that description was parked across the street from the skate park watching them through binoculars.

The police, who were already at the family's home, dispatched other officers to the park area to check things out, according to Shelley.

The police missed the suspect, but the man in question was spotted, by Mitch and his friends, parked in the outdoor swimming pool and the Lebovic Leisure Centre lots.

"Tell me he's not cruising," Shelley said.

The man is described as being about 40 years old, six feet tall, 180 to 190 pounds, mid-cropped chestnut coloured hair with a neatly shaven goatee and mustache. He was wearing dark glasses along with a fluorescent orange T-shirt and baseball hat.

He was driving a silver, four-door sedan with boxy front and back ends. The vehicle had a circular insignia with writing inside of it.

"I want this town to be taken back. This scum. It's insane what happened to an 11-year-old," Shelley said.

York Regional Police have no suspects, but the investigation is ongoing. This appears to be an isolated incident, according to Sgt. Gary Phillips.

"We don't want to create panic," he said this week. "If there was a concern for the public, we would be issuing (a media release) but at this point, we are not."

Although no physical contact occurred between Elizabeth and the man, Shelley is having her daughter attend one-on-one counselling.

"She's totally compartmentalized it and I don't know what will happen in the future," she said.
