Camping, BMX area scrubbed

Public outcry over major park plans

This time last year, it looked like Bruce's Mill Conservation Area was headed towards becoming a recreation mecca with RV and tent camping, rope climbing and a BMX bike trail.

But the outcry was crystal clear.

All of those proposed activities, except for perhaps a splash pad, have been taken off the table in favour of more nature-based activities.

"They felt it was being overprogrammed. We were putting
too much on the site," said Mike
Bender, manager of conservation lands for the Toronto and
Region Conservation Authority,
which operates the Stouffville
Road park. "There were a lot of
good ideas, but trying to fit all of
these ideas in one location was
too much."

So it was back to the drawing board.

The TRCA presented its updated master plan for Bruce's Mill at an open house meeting Monday night in Stouffville.

"How can we build on what's

New chief wants stronger community ties

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York Region's incoming police chief says he plans to strengthen ties with community groups across the region once he takes over next month.

Deputy Chief Eric Jolliffe has served with York Regional Police 29 years. He will take over as police chief Dec. 13, the region's police services board announced yester-

He replaces Armand La Barge, who retires Dec. 12.

"We have grown communitybased policing here in the region and the way you grow community-based policing is by developing partners in the community and that's exactly what we've done and exactly what we're going to continue to do," the incoming chief said.

He called the announcement of his new job a "pretty exciting moment" and admitted he has big shoes to fill.

"I'm still wrapping my head around this opportunity," he said.

York Regional Police has more than 1,400 officers and 520 civilian

support staff.

Meeting with command staff, with an open ear to ideas, will be at the top of his list after taking over.

Incoming chief Jolliffe, who grew up in Thornhill, worked with Edmonton police before coming to York police.
